Opinion of Tax List

I submit the following: A full board agreed to pick a man each. Falter agreed on Travis, I on Byron Clark, the county attorney also gave his opinion. I gave Mr. Clark's opinion to the county clerk and he read it to the entire board, also the county attorney read it and all in the treasurer's office read it. Does this look like concealing any matter or keeping it from the public?

The Post of November 2 has a lengthy article about me accusing me of all sorts of wrong doings. It says I charged for Sundays. I don't know that I have, but if I worked for the county Sundays I ought to have pay for it. It also says I have charged excess mileage. Let us see. Falter lives five miles from town, mileage fifty cents, two trips \$1.00. I live forty miles, mileage \$4.00, two trips \$8.00 so you will see that my bills should be \$7.00 more than his each month, but they are not they are about the same. Now again, sometimes we don't get through so as to go home on the early train, then I go around by Omaha and Lincoln. My fare that way is \$1.65 from Plattsmouth to Lincoln, from Lincoln to Elmwood seventy cents, the same coming back, making \$4.70, two trips making \$9.40. This is actual cash that I pay out, so where does the excess mileage come in. Now, again, by going around by Omaha and Lincoln I got home the same day. And the other way, if I did not get off in the morning I would have to wait until the next day, then I would be entitled to another days work. When I went around by Omaha and Lincoln I never charged mileage, just charged what I paid out. And if I did charge anything that I was not entitled to what was the tax-eyed commissioners that the Post speaks of doing. It reflects on them as well as it does on me, for it looks as if they were not attending to their business. Mr. Young tells me that he would not swear that he did not have sundays in through a mistake.

The distance from Plattsmouth to Elmwood via Omaha and Lincoln is just 100 miles and at ten cents per mile, what the law allows, would be \$10 per trip and two trips per month would be \$20, but only the actual car fare has been charged in all these cases.
