The October term of the federal court began at Omaha today, the day being spent in calling the docket. Judge Carlin of South Dakota will arrive in the city Tuesday afternoon, and court will be held in two rooms Wednesday. It is Judge Munger's purpose to clear the docket.

Seven men filed petition in the federal clerk's office at Omaha yesterday morning, praying the benefits of the bankrupt law. These are: David Littlejohn, Hanover, Cass county; Henry C. Stoll, Beatrice; John Fitzgibbon, Wilber; Thomas J. Woods, Beatrice; Ferdinand Lau, Norfolk; John Rogers and Charles H. Hinsdale, Tekamah. The case of State vs. Henry Osenkopp was the first jury trial called this term and is taking the time of court today. The case is an unusual one and attracts considerable attention.
