President McKinley has been invited to take part in the Masonic ceremonies at Mt. Vernon December 14, to mark the centennial of the death of George Washington. The exercises will consist, as nearly as possible, of a duplication or reproduction of the funeral ceremonies of December 18, 1788. The lodge in which Wash-

ton was made a Mason and the Washington Alexandria lodge, of which he was the first master, will take prominent parts in the ceremonies. Masons from all parts of the world are expected to be present.

Two prominent New Yorkers, Ellhu Root and Joseph Choate, are talked of for the vacant ambassadorship to England. Root is said to be supported by Senator Platt and Choate by Senator Hanna. The contest will determine the strength of two senatorial pulls.

James Gray, the newly elected mayor of Minneapolis, started life as a newsboy, earned money sufficient to keep him while going to the common schools, graduated from the State university and became a reporter on and then managing editor of the Minneapolis Times.

Farmer Sibley of Pennsylvania, recently elected to congress, is not as enthusiastic for free coinage of silver as he was two years ago. "The silver question," he says, "has been dead since 1896, and I have no time to busy myself with dead issues." Farmer Sibley dislikes whistling in a graveyard.

Blatherskite Smith, who has been ousted as deputy attorney general, was the most abusive and untruthful public speaker who took part in last fall's campaign. He has been bounced to give place to W. D. Oldham of Kearney. Mr. Oldham laugh, and the decent people of Nebraska laugh with you. It was a just Nemesis which followed Smith and pushed him overboard.

This country's vast and various food products have made it the granary of the world. Through the preponderance of exports over imports during the last two years this country stands today a creditor nation to almost all others. We are loaning to London, Germany and France vast sums of money. Instead of our bills of exchange made against our exports going to London for discount, as heretofore, they are taken up on this side and held for temporary investment. Our present rate of interest is half that of the Bank of England; and one-third of the Bank of Berlin rate, notwithstanding that we have had nearly \$500,000,000 of our securities returned to us during the last several years, all of which have been taken up and absorbed by our own investors. The money conditions of this country as compared with those of European nations, together with the outlook of the future, I do not hesitate to say, make New York City at this moment the great financial centre of the world, and it would be well for the American people to so recognize it; and, for neomore, in the alliance with Great Britain we have a combination that will dominate the world. In view of these facts, I do not hesitate to say that the banking business of the city of New York is on a safer and sounder basis than that of any other financial centre in the world. HENRY CLEWS.
