HE IS NOT A CANDIDATE

Assistant Secretary Meiklejohn Denies the Charge.

Says He Is Not a Candidate For United States Senator and Thinks the South Platte Territory Is Entitled to a Representative—Negotiations at Paris May Result in Two Treaties.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Assistant Secretary Meiklejohn is not a candidate for the United States senate, as is shown by the following letter addressed in answer to a communication from Hon. W. T. Thompson, Central City, Neb., representative in the state legislature, inquiring if he was a candidate:

"WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—My Dear Thompson: I have the honor to acknowledge your esteemed favor of recent date, inquiring if I am or will be a candidate for United States senator, to which I answer no.

"The South Platte territory is entitled to a representative in the senate of the United States and the republicans should have no difficulty in making a choice from the many excellent candidates who have already announced themselves.

"Above all things I desire republican success in Nebraska.

"Personal ambition should always be subservient to party interest and a wise selection from this section of the state will redound to the advancement of the party and become a potent factor in our politics.

"With renewed assurances of high esteem and consideration, I am yours very sincerely, G. D. MEIKLEJOHN."

Two Treaties May Be Signed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The impression prevails here that the results of the negotiations at Paris will be embodied in two or more treaties, instead of one. There will be one actual peace treaty, embodying nothing more than the protocol points relating to the relinquishment of Spanish sovereignty over Cuba and the Spanish West Indies, Guam and the Philippines, with the single exception of the proviso for the release of prisoners. All the other matters, those relating to the renewal of the commercial treaties, the acquisition of cable and coal-gathering stations and in fact all those extraneous matters that have been mentioned as likely to be incorporated in the peace treaty, will form the subject of a special treaty. This course is likely to be adopted in order to hasten the conclusion of peace, for which there is a great necessity, if for no other reason than to secure the release of prisoners and the restoration of trade between Spain and the United States.

Must Protect Foreigners

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The secretary of state has received a copy of a decree recently issued by the emperor of China, having for its object the better protection of foreign residents in that country. The decree says in part: "From the opening of ports to foreign trade to the present time, foreigners and Chinese have been as one family, with undivided interests, and since missionaries from countries are living in the interior we have decreed, not three or four times, but many times, that the local officers must protect them and that the gentry and people of all provinces must sympathize with our desire for mutual benevolence; that they must treat them truthfully and honestly, with the hope of lasting relations."

LETTER FROM THIRD NEBRASKA.

Former Plattsmouth Boy Writes Entertainingly From Savannah.

As everyone is interested in the soldier boys the following letter, received by John E. Marshall of THE NEWS, will be read with interest:

SAVANNAH, Ga., Dec. 1.—Your letter arrived O. K., but I failed to find any "Exquisitos" enclosed. Surely you will remember the "corporal" with a cigar (box) or two.

You're right—I haven't "done up" any Spaniards, but I made a Frenchman (Victor Voltaire by name) think I was about six of them. He refused to obey my orders and was about to clean me up when I "gently" went after him. I also saw Lieutenant Webster, who has charge of me, and he immediately sent him back to his company.

I have been detached from my company and am now with the First Brigade provost guards. I have charge of sixteen men and place guards around the First Brigade corral at night. This corral contains 200 government mules, and as there are negroes down in this part of the country who "might" steal, they are thus guarded. In the day time we keep the First Brigade officers' tents in good condition and are also in readiness to help move camp when orders are given. I am kept pretty busy, but like the job. All the guards are good men and I like them all. They think Hiram George (or corporal) should say about right.

My health is excellent—tipping the scales at 170—that's not bad, considering the food we get. You ought to see me eat. Uncle Sam surely loses money when I commence to perform at the table.

Last night the Savannah Journal contained an article that the Seventh Army Corps would be mustered out inside of thirty days. You ought to hear the soldiers (11,000 of them) yell. Did the boys buy papers? Everybody purchased papers. If we are going to be mustered out—as everybody says—why are they giving us new rifles, new tents and buying more mules? I don't believe the report, but I am the only one who don't believe it. For my part I would just as soon go to Cuba as stay here. Just now there is more yelling outside. Another report, I guess.

The Third Nebraska has got its grounds in better shape than any regiment in the Seventh Army Corps. It is a beautiful camp and is kept in excellent condition. They have better tents, too. They are of heavy canvas and look very neat. Our new rifle—the Craig-Jorgensen—is a fine gun. The magazine will hold five shells and the chamber one shell. It can be fired very rapidly and kills at 1,800 yards, a little over a mile.

Company "H" of the Third Nebraska regiment is up town on provost duty, having taken the place of the Fourth Illinois companies.

Well, I will close as it is time to blow out my candle.
