PASSED TO HER REWARD

Death of Mrs. Emma Searles of Bright's Disease.

Had Been a Respected Resident of Plattsmouth For Many Years—The Annual Ice Harvest Almost Completed—Something About the Manner in Which It Is Secured—Ice of Good Quality.

Mrs. Emma Searles, wife of Ira B. Searles, died at 10 o'clock this morning at her home on North Eighth street, after a lingering illness of several months with Bright's disease.

Deceased was about sixty years of age and had resided in Plattsmouth for many years, removing from Indiana to this city with her husband. She had a large number of friends in this city and was a dutiful wife and kind mother. She leaves a husband and one daughter to mourn her demise, the latter, Mrs. Dollie Dodd, being at her bedside at the time of her death.

Dr. George Chapman of Lincoln and Dr. Chapman of Missouri Valley, Ia., brothers of deceased, will arrive in the city this evening and the arrangements for the funeral will be perfected tomorrow morning and announced in tomorrow evening's NEWS.

A Good Ice Harvest.
Ice packers were never favored with a better time to put up ice than the present and they are taking advantage of it. H. C. McMaken & Son, George Poissal and a number of private parties are getting their supply this week. Poissal also has the contract for filling the Krug Brewing company's ice house. McMaken does the cutting and loading for all the packers except Poissal, who has an outfit of his own. It is quite a sight to see the work of cutting and loading the ice. It is first-timed off with large scrapers, after which it is marked off in sections about eighteen inches square and then cut about seven inches deep with a plow drawn by two horses. A log chute is arranged and the men use the ice in strips and standing on them float them down the current to the chute where, with a heavy rope, the ice is drawn up the chute with a team, tons at a time, and loaded on the wagons. One man stands at the head of the chute with a large iron bar and severs the cakes as they are drawn along. It requires but a few moments to load a wagon.

It is expected that the work will be finished the first of next week and Plattsmouth will be supplied with the best ice it has had in many years.

RAILROAD NOTES AND PERSONALS

Phil Wurtemberger, who has charge of the carpenter department of the Burlington at Deadwood, came down yesterday for a few days' visit with his family. He expects to remove his family to Deadwood in the spring.

Burlington engine No. 17 was brought to the Plattsmouth shops for repairs yesterday, having encountered a slight mishap in the South Omaha yards.

Contractor Sawtelle went to Omaha this afternoon and will go to Lincoln tomorrow morning in response to a letter from the Burlington officials. He is of the opinion that they want to make another contract with him on the bridge fill. His present contract is nearly finished, but owing to the cold weather has stopped until spring. It is expected that the fill will be made up even with the track and the dirt taken from the other side instead of widening the cut on this side, as was originally talked. To take dirt from this side would interfere with traffic too much.

Andy Nelson, who has been working with the Burlington pile driver gang at Beatrice, has been visiting in the city for a few days.

The K. C. passenger train north was about four hours late today on account of an accident on the Hannibal & St. Joe road this morning. It pulled in just ahead of the fast mail.

A portion of the Rock Island bridge at South Bend was burned a few days ago. It is supposed to have caught fire from an engine.
