

Ludlow States That Havana Is Two Centuries Behind.

Death of Charles Edgerton. From Wednesday's Daily.

Charles Edgerton, a resident of this city for many years, died near Bancroft, on the Indian reservation, Monday afternoon, and the remains were brought here last night.

Decayed had been the victim of a great many accidents, the primary cause of his death being from an explosion in a mine several years ago, causing an abscess to form near his lungs.

Accompanied by his wife he went to the Indian reservation last August with the hope that the change would be beneficial to his health, but he gradually failed until death relieved him of his suffering.

He was thirty-one years of age and was a son of Mr. and Mrs. William Edgerton, residing about two miles south of town.

Funeral services will be held at the United Brethren church, on the other side of the river tomorrow at 10 o'clock and interment will be made in the family burying ground at Pacific City, Ia.

VOLUNTEERS REJOICE.

News That They Are to Be Mustered Out Received With Cheers.

Advices From Washington to the Effect That Iowa and Nebraska to Be Mustered Out of Service—Third and Twenty-second Infantry to Embark For Manila.

HAVANA, Jan. 18.—Private advices from Washington were received at camp last evening indicating that the Forty-ninth Iowa, Fourth Illinois, Fourth Virginia and Third Nebraska volunteer regiments will soon be mustered out. The news spread rapidly through the camp and the members of three regiments cheered again and again, a great cheer from one regiment being answered in kind by another.

El Diario de la Marina, La Lucha, El Pais and La Discusion, as well as other papers less influential, indulge in editorial criticisms of the United States military administration, asserting that it tends to anarchy. They declare that each provincial governor and each garrison commander is a military dictator, acting independently of the governor general and exercising administrative, legislative, judicial and even ecclesiastical functions.

As a result of this system, as these papers regard it, there is no uniformity of action in details and no general code of administration for the various localities.

The newly appointed cabinet secretaries will have distinctly limited powers. They are merely heads of departments under General Brooke's direct control, reporting to him regularly, with the responsibility for decisions and acts vested exclusively in the governor general.

Fifteen days are allowed householders within which to comply with the new health regulations, after which, in cases of non-compliance, the military government will do the work at the householders' expense.

General Jimenez Castelanos, former captain general of Cuba, on arriving at Cienfuegos made an inspection of the city hospitals and jails and released all prisoners except one, a murderer.

Senor Antonio Fries will probably be appointed mayor of Cienfuegos. The citizens of Santa Clara city object to having the capital of the province removed to Cienfuegos and propose appealing to President McKinley against the suggested change.

Major General Ludlow has been informed of the frightful condition of the municipal hospitals at Alcega, where there is an assemblage of patients, including criminals and insane persons, with little food and that very unsuitable and all the conditions of great wretchedness. The nurses have been attending smallpox cases and then passing to other patients, without a change of clothing or any other precaution against carrying the infection. Prompt measures will be taken to equip a hospital in the immediate neighborhood that will allow a separation of the patients.

Fleet For Manila Is Ready. SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 18.—The last fleet of transports for Manila will sail from this port in a week or ten days. The Scandia, Morgan City, Senator, Ohio and Centennial will all leave within a day or two of each other. The Twentieth infantry will go on the Scandia and Morgan City, and the Third and Twenty-second infantry regiments on the Ohio and Senator.

The Centennial, which is expected in from Seattle on Sunday, will carry to Manila a load of army freight which is now waiting for it. The Senator and Ohio will be ready for use again about the 23rd. The Scandia will be ready on the date promised, the 25th of this month.
