Electric Power Drainage of a Coal Field. One of the greatest coal fields of England, some thirty-two square miles in area, has numerous pumps established at as many different points to pump out the water. There are fifty pumps in all. If the project is successfully carried out it will be one of the most striking applications of electric distribution and control of power yet installed.
