ISSUANCE OF PARDONS

The governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason, and to remit fines and forfeitures upon such conditions and limitations as he may think proper, subject to the regulations prescribed in this chapter. But no pardon shall be granted until after notice shall have first been given for two weeks of such application for a pardon by publishing the said notice in a newspaper printed in the county where the conviction was had, which notice shall state the name of the applicant, offense of which he was convicted, in what court and when convicted, and the time when the application will be made, and in case no newspaper is published in such county then the said notice may be given by posting the same at the court house door of said county two weeks before such applica-
