DAVID LLOYD DEAD

One Of Cass County's Representative Men Called To His Long Home.

David M. Lloyd, a prominent farmer residing west and north of Murray, departed this life at his home Monday evening. Mr. Lloyd has been one of Cass county's leading men for many years, and his place in the community will be hard to fill. David M. Lloyd was born in New York state in the year of 1845 and came to Nebraska when quite a young man. Here he was married in 1876 to Miss Catherine Totten, Judge Newell performing the ceremony on the 25th day of March of that year. One son has been born to this marriage, a young man who survives his father.

Beside his wife and son, the deceased leaves surviving, three brothers, being Joseph of this city and George and John living on a farm in this county. One sister Mrs. Clint Totten survives also.

The funeral of Mr. Lloyd occurred today (Thursday) at the Presbyterian church in Murray at 11 o'clock. Mr. Lloyd had been ill for some time prior to his death with chronic stomach trouble, but until a few days ago it was thought he was not dangerously sick. The community sympathizes deeply with the grief stricken wife and son, in their bereavement.

POULTRY FANCIERS

Meet At Glenwood--Dr. Hall Takes 1st On Cockerel--1st and 2nd On Pullets.

The Glenwood Poultry Fanciers Association met at Glenwood this week in their annual gathering, and the denizens of the other side of the river were surprised when prizes were awarded on score cards by the judges.
