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COUNCIL COMMITTEE

Meets and Considers the Important Question of Light for the City.

The light committee of the city council and the committee appointed by J. P. Falter, president of the commercial club, held a joint meeting at the office of Mr. Falter Saturday evening, behind closed doors. The following proposition was there submitted by the Nebraska Lighting Co.: To furnish eighteen gas lamps of 45 c. p. on Main street and the avenues, all night service, and eighty-two incandescent lamps of 32 c. p. in the residence part of the city, midnight service, for the sum of \$1900 yearly for a term of five years. The company to obligate itself to give satisfactory service and put its plant in first class condition within six months. The price of light to the private consumers was to be at an average of the following cities: Grand Island, Hastings, Fremont, Beatrice and Norfolk. The agreement was signed up by the committee except Councilman Vondran, and after considerable discussion which Bortenlanger, the Glenwood capitalist, insisted on "butting into," it was decided to put the whole matter over until tomorrow night, when Bortenlanger will submit something different. It is said that he proposes to build a plant here, but during the time required to install the same will furnish the light required here by cable from Glenwood. The meeting was a warm one throughout.
