Nothing was disturbed except two boxes of cigars near the big safe at north end of the store. No cigars were taken, but the boxes were left on the floor, and had evidently been accidentally struck by a foot in passing and knocked from the shelf, which was low. After getting the cash from the register, the thieves evidently had designs on Col. Bates' silken tile, as they broke a glass in the window of the Journal office and went in. Here they were evidently disappointed, as nothing was disturbed, and the chairs were left circling the base burner where the festive luncheon had evidently tasted their slimy hands before treading the next job. They went to Kuzman and Range's meat market where they took about \$4.00 in cash from the register. This was found unopened, as the merchants have acquired wisdom from the experience of Florence Road, who had his cash register smashed up with a pry bar and a few blades and had since left their registers in a locked up state. They would get many less than it would take to repair a register.
