Excursion on April 6th
To See Canada Land, Parties Going With Us Last Trip Bought Land There.

Either Mr. She'd of Ashland or myself will accompany parties in Cass and adjoining counties to Alberta, Canada on Tuesday, April 6 and Tuesday, April 20. The young men who went with us this month purchased land and concluded to stay right there and go to work. They purchased a 40-horse power gasoline engine and a six-bottom breaker and are now ready for business. They have already contracted for over 1,000 acres to break at \$3 per acre. They were so favorably impressed with both climate and soil that they did not take three or four months to investigate conditions in the Alberta province, as they had contemplated doing. Good, productive land at \$15 an acre, on easy payments is becoming a scarce article. Iron Ore Goes on the Free List.
In the metal-schedule the following changes are made:
Iron ore and basic slag, from 40 cents per ton to the free list.
Pig iron, iron kettles and spiegel-iron, from \$4 per ton to \$2.50.
Scrap iron and steel, from \$4 per ton to 50 cents per ton.
Bar iron, from six-tenths of 1 cent to four-tenths of 1 cent per pound.
Round iron, less than seven-sixteenths of one inch in diameter, from eight-tenths of 1 cent per pound.
Slabs, blooms, loops, or other forms less finished than bars, from five-tenths of 1 cent to four-tenths of 1 cent per pound.
Charcoal iron, from \$12 to \$6 per ton.
Beams, girders, joists, angles, etc., from five-tenths of 1 cent to three-tenths of 1 cent per pound.
Anchors, from 1 1/2 cents per pound to 1 cent.
Iron and steel forging, from 35 per cent to 30 per cent ad valorem.
Hoop, band or scroll iron or steel, not thinner than No. 10 wire gauge, from five-tenths of 1 cent to three-tenths of 1 cent per pound; thinner than No. 10 and not thinner than No. 20, from six-tenths of 1 cent to four-tenths of 1 cent per pound; thinner than No. 20, from eight-tenths to six-tenths of 1 cent per pound. Steel bands or strips, untempered, suitable for making band saws, from 3 cents per pound to 1 1/2 cents; if tempered, from 6 cents per pound and 20 per cent ad valorem to 3 cent per pound and 20 per cent ad valorem.
Cotton ties from five-tenths of 1 cent per pound to three-tenths.

Changes in Paper and Wood Pulp Schedules.
Changes in the paper schedule, which include those recommended by the special committee on wood pulp and print paper investigations, are:
Surface coated papers, covered with metal, from 3 cents and 20 per cent to 5 cents and 20 per cent ad valorem; other surface coated paper, from 2 1/2 cents per pound and 15 per cent ad valorem to 5 cents per pound.
Lithographic prints, from 6 cents per pound to 8 cents; cardboard, from 20 cents to 25 cents per pound; other paper 20 cents to 25 cents per pound, with small increases on various sizes of other paper. Lithographic cigar labels, from 20 cents per pound to 30 cents per pound printed in colors less than eight, from 20 cents to 30 cents per pound; more than eight, from than eight, from 30 cents to 37 1/2 cents per pound; printed in metal leaf, from 50 cents per pound to 52 1/2 cents per pound; paper hangings, from 25 per cent to 30 per cent ad valorem; paper not specially provided for, from 25 per cent to 35 per cent ad valorem.
Plain paper envelopes, from 20 per cent to 30 per cent ad valorem.
The recommendations of the select committee were to permit the free entry of mechanically ground wood pulp from any country not imposing export duty, and to reduce printing paper valued at not above 21-4 cents per pound, from three-tenths to one-tenth of 1 per cent per pound; valued not above 21-2 cents a pound, from four-tenths to two-tenths of 1 per cent per pound.

Rules Governing Contest

The automobile-piano contest will close at 6 p. m., Saturday, April 3. The automobile and other prizes will be awarded as soon after the closing as will be possible to count the votes. The closing of each contest will take place at the same time and will be conducted in the same manner, so there will be no unfairness whatever. All names and money must be in by the closing hour.
Voting cards may be made out after 6 o'clock if necessary, but no money or names will be received after that time. We would also like for the contestants to make their reports as early in the day as possible so we can have the votes made out by the time the contest closes as we will want to get to counting as soon after 6 o'clock as we can.
The votes in all of the contests will be counted for the last time, until the final count is made at the close of the contest, on Monday evening, March 29, at which time each publisher will forward the standing of his contestants to all of the other publishers. The standing of the leading contestant of each paper will then be announced in the papers of that week. This will be the last information given out from any of the publishers regarding the standing of any of the contestants.

TARIFF ON SAWED LUMBER CUT ONE-HALF.
The following changes are made in the lumber schedule:
Timber, from 1 cent per cubic foot to one-half of 1 cent per cubic foot.
Sawed boards, planks of whitewood, sycamore and basswood, from \$1 per thousand to 50 cents per thousand.
All other sawed lumber, from \$2 to \$1.
If further advanced and manufactured, the same reduction from the present law.
Paving posts, railroad ties, telephone poles, and so forth, from 20 per cent to 10 per cent ad valorem.
Clapboard, from \$1.50 per thousand to \$1 per thousand.
Kindling wood transferred to the free list.
Laths, from 25 cents per 1,000 pieces to 20 cents per 1,000 pieces.
Fence posts, from 10 per cent to the free list.


