THE COUNTY BOARD

REGULAR MEETING HELD AND USUAL AMOUNT OF ROUTINE BUSINESS TRANSACTED.

Plattsmouth, Neb., May 4, 1909.

County Commissioners met in regular session with all members present, minutes of previous meeting read and approved, whereupon the following business was transacted in regular form:

In the matter of the petition of Geo. Horn and 40 others praying that a liquor license be granted to Andres Thomsen for the sale of malt, spirituous and vinous liquors for the period of one year at Cedar Creek, Cass county Nebraska; the Board first voted as to whether or not a license should be granted in the village of Cedar Creek, Friedrich and Jordan voting yes and Switzer voting no. The Board then proceeded to vote upon the petition of Geo. Horn and others praying that a license be granted to Andres Thomsen to sell malt, spirituous and vinous liquors for a period of one year, commencing May 17, 1909 to May 17, 1910, at the village of Cedar Creek, Cass county, Nebraska, and the petition was granted as prayed for and county clerk ordered to issue license to Andres Thomsen upon the payment of the sum of \$1000; bond of Andres Thomsen also approved for the sale of liquors at Cedar Creek.

In the matter of the application of John Gauer and 43 others praying that a license be granted to Henry Leuhtweis to sell malt, spirituous and vinous liquors at Cedar Creek, Cass county, Nebraska, was taken up for hearing and same was refused by the board.

A small tract of land in South Bend precinct was leased to the county by C. S. Wortman from the 4th day of May, 1911 for the consideration of \$10.
