### To Make War On Flies

Public health officials of Nebraska will meet in Omaha next Monday and Tuesday at the Rome hotel to form a state organization. The call for the meeting has been issued by Dr. D. T. Quigley, city physician of North Platte and it is expected that about 200 health officers will attend the meeting.

North Platte is the city which has waged such a successful war against flies, and in his call for the state meeting Dr. Quigley says the purpose of the meeting is to "get after the flies and other microbe bearing insects and plants."

Dr. Quigley goes on the theory that "prevention is better than cure," or, he says, "It is better to prevent disease than to attack it." He has solicited the cooperation of all county physicians in Nebraska. And he urges that action be taken promptly so as to have the campaign at work before the hot weather invites the full brigade into action.

Dr. Quigley has been advocating this action for some time. Under date of May 14, he addressed a letter to the Bee which was published, in which he said:

"In line with the present rapidly developing sentiment in favor of the idea of preventing disease instead of attacking it after it has developed, and the spread of life-saving medical intelligence, I want to bring before the public the necessity of organization of the public health officers and the need of public support of such an organization, after it has been effected.—Lincoln Journal.

Flies lay their eggs only in fermenting or decaying substances—by preference in horse manure. Hence every stable is a source of infection unless periodically disinfected. The fly maggot is also hatched out in latrines and ashpit refuse, such as bedding, straw, rags, paper, scraps of meat, fruit, etc., on which substances the larvae subsist after they hatch, which occurs in about twelve days after the egg has been laid. It is estimated that a single fly, laying 120 eggs at a time, will produce a progeny amounting to sextillions by the end of the season.

The number of bacteria upon a single fly have been proved to range all the way from 550 to 6,600,000. The average for 414 flies which were examined at the Agricultural Experimental Station at Storrs, Conn., last year was 1-4 million bacteria apiece. This represents about the number of bacteria that enter the human system when one swallows a glass of liquid into which some fly has perhaps fallen, to be removed by a slovenly waiter without the liquid being thrown away.—Frank Fleischman.

### Mass Meeting Of Farmers.

On June 18 a mass meeting of farmers will be held at Hastings, Neb. The purpose will be to discuss the American Society of Equity's plan of controlling marketing of winter wheat and the establishing of co-operative packing plants as a means of controlling the marketing of live stock and the live stock products. It is expected that farmers from all parts of Nebraska and Kansas will be present. Hon. C. O. Drayton, President of the National Union of the American Society of Equity, Mr. Theo. G. Nelson, President of National Grain Growers' Association and Mr. J. C. Davis, National Lecturer of the Society of Equity, will be present and take part in the program. It is also likely that Gov. Shallenberger and Ex-Congressman Pollard will be present and deliver addresses.

On June 19 delegates representing the membership of the Society who have already pledged their grain this year will meet in executive session for the purpose of determining how, when, where, for what price, etc., the grain in the pool shall be sold. Only those who have pledged grain will have a voice in or be admitted to this meeting.

This is one of a series of a hundred mass meetings called under the auspices of the American Society of Equity in the agricultural states of the union for the same purpose, and will no doubt be of considerable importance to the farmers of Nebraska and Kansas.
