The Gering-Leyda Case Now on Trial in the District Court.

THE SUIT IS FOR \$5,000.00 DAMAGES

Judge Good of Saunders County the Presiding Judge in the Case

The jury and Judge Good of Saunders county were engaged in the plamage suit of Gering vs Leyda. The great part of the afternoon yesterday and all the morning today. The defendant objected to this advertisement going to the jury and the court seemed inclined to sustain the objection, for the reason that the article was signed by several of the local old line insurance agents beside the defendant, but the defendant withdrew his objection and the paper went to the jury.

Mr. Wm. Holly was called to the stand and identified the advertisement as one he had signed for Mr. Leyda. Mr. Gering again took the stand and detailed his meeting with Sam Beggs, the detective who purchased the liquor from Mr. Gering, which resulted in the county attorney, Mr. Rawls filing a prosecution against H. R. Gering the plaintiff in the case now on trial, which was dismissed at the time.
