**Gets Eighteen Years.**  
This community was considerably worked up when it became known that Frank Baird was implicated in the bold robbery of the Sullivan household in Marion county, Iowa, several weeks ago, not from a sympathetic standpoint, however, but from the simple fact that he once resided here, and was pretty well known. But no one seemed in the least surprised. His trial took place the fore part of last week at Knoxville, and he was convicted, but Judge Gamble, before whom Baird was tried, postponed the sentence until Saturday, when a term of 18 years was given him in the Iowa penitentiary. In passing sentence upon Baird, the Judge strongly intimated that W. A. Richards, ex-deputy United Marshal, was an accessory to the crime for which Baird was convicted. It is also reported that Baird's wounds are of that nature that he is not likely to serve many years behind the walls of the penitentiary.
