

### Another Pioneer Gone.

Last week the Journal mentioned he death of Oliver Ward, one of the oldest and best known men in Cass county. Speaking of the death of Mr. Ward, the Louisville Courier says:

"Oliver Ward, one of Cass county's aged citizens, living four miles southeast of Louisville, passed away last Sunday after several weeks of illness.

"Oliver Ward was born in Putman county, Indiana, December 25, 1824. Was married to Sarah A. Jenkins on September 22, 1846. After three years residence in Indiana he moved to Missouri, from which state he moved to Iowa in 1855; then moving to Nebraska in 1861, he made his home in Cass county until his death. April 5, 1903. During the Indian trouble in the early history of the state he served as a soldier under Captain Wiles of Platts-
