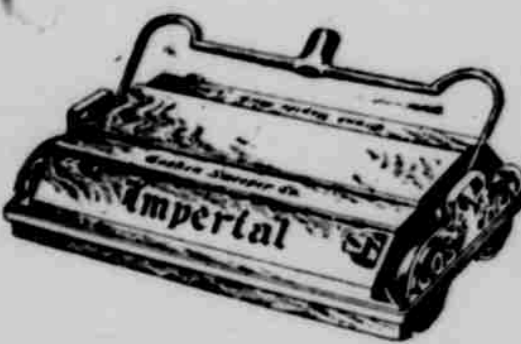

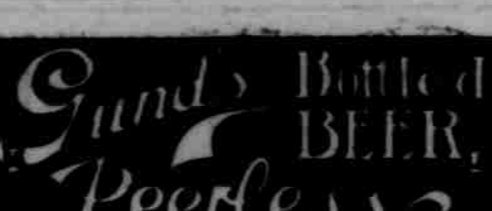

Crop Conditions.

The week has been cool and wet. In the eastern portion of the state the temperature has averaged about 8 degrees below normal and in the western portion about 3 degrees below.

Except on the northern boundary and in the extreme western counties, the rainfall has been generally above an inch and in a good many localities the amounts have been excessive. Several stations report over 4 inches.

The cool, wet week has been unfavorable for the best growth of corn; the earlier fields are generally in the roasting-ear stage; late corn needs much warmer weather for the best results. Very little stacking or threshing has been done because of the heavy rains; in the northern counties threshing has hardly begun. Some injury to grain in shock is reported from about a dozen of southeastern counties. A fine crop of hay is being secured. Pastures are in excellent condition. Fall plowing is in progress in southern counties where the soil is sufficiently dry.
