Failed to Comply With the Law.

When the new village board recently met in Louisville to grant saloon licenses, they were confronted with a remonstrance signed by a number of anti-saloon people, who were represented by Attorney Darnell of the Nebraska Anti-Saloon League, protesting against granting licenses on the grounds that the applicants had not filed their petitions according to law with the village clerk. The applicants were represented by Matthew Gering and the village board by Jacob Beeson, of this city. The saloon men were advised by Mr. Gering, that, as they had not complied strictly with the letter of the law, that it would be best to re-advertise and again apply for license on the 17th of May. It seems the druggists are in the same predicament and are also compelled to re-advertise. Thus Louisville is totally dry for the first time since the town became an incorporated village.
