NEWS OF NEBRASKA.

Injuring May Cause Death.
Lincoln, June 2.—Phil Huntley, a youth of eighteen years, was struck by an automobile and the physician says he will die. He was crossing the street and was struck by a machine belonging to Wittman Bros. His skull was fractured at the base of the brain.

Farmer's Wife Kills Herself.
Stanton, Neb., June 8.—Mrs. August Knessel, wife of a German farmer living near here, committed suicide by hanging. Knessel found her lifeless body hanging from a stay in a corncrib. Mrs. Knessel was not of strong mind and sending her to an asylum had been considered.

Find Body in River.
Fullerton, Neb., June 8.—The body of Charles Carlson was found in the Cedar river just below the milldam at this place. Carlson was a farm hand about forty years old. He was last seen in Fullerton last Thursday evening. No one seems to know anything of the accident.

Long Trip by Homesick Dog.
Omaha, June 4.—Homesickness caused a sixteen-months-old Newfoundland dog to tramp from Portland, Ore., to Omaha. Jerry Sullivan, his owner moved east a year ago. The dog disliked the new home, and after six months disappeared. He has now arrived here, gaunt and shaggy and with blistered feet. He went at once to his old home.

Stopped by Injunction.
Omaha, June 4.—Deputy Sheriff Sherry served a writ of injunction on Marshal Christian of Iowa enjoining him from forcibly taking Tom Dennison on the requisition granted by Governor Mickey earlier in the day, except when the court is in session, or without giving Dennison a reasonable time for filing his application for a writ of habeas corpus.

Mickey Honors One Requisition.
Lincoln, June 3.—Governor Mickey honored the requisition of Governor Bailey of Kansas for the return to that state of Edgar Evans, wanted in Jackson county on a charge of assault. The governor denied the requisition from the governor of Washington for the return from Creighton, Neb., of W. H. Disbrow, accused of obtaining money under false pretenses.

Gregg Succeeds George Rogers.
Lincoln, June 6.—Governor Mickey appointed Charles H. Gregg, a merchant of Kearney, as member of the state board of education to take the place of George Rogers of Omaha, whose term expires June 24. A number of names were presented to the governor for the place, but the fact that Gregg lives in Kearney, the location of the new normal school, was in his favor.

BANNER COUNTY MEN SHOOT.
Edward Sharp Seriously Injured by E. C. Lewis in Fight Over Woman.
Kimball, Neb., June 7.—Edward Sharp was shot and perhaps fatally wounded by E. C. Lewis, just over the line in Banner county. Lewis who is a married man, has been in Wyoming for several weeks and on his return heard that Sharp has been paying attention to his wife. He borrowed a gun and horse and started for Sharp's home in Banner county. It seems that Lewis met Sharp and Mrs. Lewis on the road and the shooting commenced at once. Lewis' first shot going through Sharp's jaw and the second shot entering the back, lodging near the breast bone after penetrating the lung.

Sharp fired one shot, which hit Lewis' horse. All three came to Kimball, Lewis giving himself to Sheriff Bartholemew. Sharp is in a precarious condition, the chances for recovery being against him.

Strike Among Des Moines Waiters.
Des Moines, June 7.—A crisis was reached in the differences between waiters and their employers in Des Moines and a strike was ordered in three of the leading restaurants.

SOIL MOIST AND CROPS GOOD.
Burlington Reports Conditions Excellent on Its Route.
Omaha, June 2.—The Burlington crop report for the state of Nebraska, week ending May 28, has just been issued. The report says: "Precipitation has been ample in all parts of the territory west of the Missouri river to keep the soil in excellent condition. The only place where ground is reported as being at all dry is in the vicinity of Sargent and Burwell. Growing crops are not suffering for moisture, however, in that vicinity. Reports relating to small grain are favorable from every quarter. Weather has been too cool and wet during the spring to advance small grain crops rapidly, but present condition is very satisfactory. Wheat and rye are beginning to head in some parts of Nebraska and Kansas. This crop is practically planted in our territory in Nebraska and Kansas; the planting of late fields will continue, however, to a limited extent for the next week or ten days, especially on low ground that has been wet all spring. A good portion of corn that has been planted is out of the ground and growing. Some of the very early corn is already being cultivated. In southeastern Nebraska and on Concordia branch we shall have considerable late corn owing to the fact that ground was too wet to permit of planting earlier. Crops in eastern Nebraska appear at this time to be ten days or two weeks later than usual because of cool and wet weather since the middle of April."

Swedish Lutheran Synod Meets.
Lindsborg, Kan., June 2.—The National Augustana synod of the Swedish Lutheran church opened its annual session here with 500 delegates present from all parts of the country. Dr. E. Norelius of Minnesota presided.

Farmer Killed in Runaway.
Columbus, Neb., June 8.—Rudolph Oppiger, a well-to-do German farmer, was almost instantly killed in a runaway accident.

C. L. Saylor Dies From Shot.
Omaha, June 5.—C. L. Saylor, office manager of the Armour Packing company in South Omaha, shot and killed himself in Hanscom park. For nearly a year Mr. Saylor had suffered from nervous disorders.

Omaha Auditorium Dedicated.
Omaha, June 8.—The new Auditorium was presented to the city and dedicated with elaborate ceremony. President Nash of the Auditorium company turned over the building to the city and Dr. George I. Miller received it in the name of the people. The grand inaugural ball was one long to be remembered.

Enforcing Dip Orders.
Lincoln, June 6.—State Veterinarian Thomas has just returned from Garfield county, in which place he learned that Sheriff Waters was making a good record for himself by compelling the enforcement of the order providing for cattle dipping. The sheriff is using the lime and sulphur dip and Dr. Thomas reports that he is doing splendid work.

Southeastern Nebraska a Sufferer.
Falls City, Neb., June 6.—Continuous heavy rains have brought creeks and rivers in southeastern Nebraska up with a rush, and caused the Ne-maha to overflow and flood the lowlands for the third time this year. Corn fields are under water and some bridges have been carried out, but if there is no further rise, railroads, it is believed, will escape the usual June washouts.

Would Revive Bartley Case.
Lincoln, June 4.—Attorney General Proul filed a petition in error in the supreme court asking that the decision in the Bartley bond case be reversed and a new trial granted. The defendants are W. A. Paxton, Thomas Swobe, Cadet Taylor, E. E. Brown, C. C. McNish and John H. Ames. In his petition Attorney General Proul points out twenty-six errors in the proceedings in the lower court on which he bases his plea for a reversal of the verdict.

Mickey Honors Requisition.
Lincoln, June 4.—Governor Mickey honored the requisition for the return of Tom Dennison to Iowa to answer to the charge of receiving stolen property. The papers were given to United States Marshal Christian of Iowa, who left at once for Omaha to arrest Dennison. In honoring the requisition Governor Mickey said the Iowa authorities had presented an indictment and an affidavit and that he must act on this showing. He could not go behind them to examine evidence as to Dennison's guilt.

DEMOCRATS MEET IN OMAHA.
Select Delegates to St. Louis Convention and Adopt Platform.
Omaha, June 2.—The Nebraska Democratic state convention unanimously selected William J. Bryan to head the Nebraska delegation to the national gathering at St. Louis and adopted a platform which reaffirms the Kansas City platform of 1900 and places before the public Mr. Bryan's views of what should be embodied in the platform of the coming national convention. Mr. Bryan was himself chairman of the committee on resolutions, and wrote the platform. He had associated with him men who have been his most loyal supporters.

There was no opposition to the adoption of the platform as read, although one delegate attempted to secure the adoption of an additional plank pledging Nebraska Democracy to the support of the nominees of the St. Louis convention, regardless of whom they might be. He was ruled out of order, however, after reading his resolution.

There were but a handful of delegates who had not been pledged to the support of a reaffirmation of the Kansas City platform and they came from Lancaster. Mr. Bryan's own county. They did not, however, attempt to secure recognition, and Mr. Bryan sat with the Lancaster delegation while he was on the floor of the convention.

The proceedings were characterized by harmony and the delegates at all times appeared anxious to outdo each other in their support of the leaders and the principles they represented.

Several speeches were delivered, among them being addresses by Mr. Bryan in support of the platform, by Congressman Cochran and the delegates selected to the national convention.

'Frisco Passenger Train Wrecked.
Cherokee, Kan., June 6.—A south-bound 'Frisco passenger train was wrecked just before reaching the station, two coaches leaving the track at a switch and crashing into a freight train. Allen Ridley, the eleven-year-old son of Thomas Ridley, the engineer, was killed and several were slightly injured. Young Ridley was walking along the railroad beside the track when the coaches left the rail and struck him. He was fearfully mangled.
