Crop Conditions.

The past week has been cool with heavy showers. The daily mean temperature has averaged four degrees below normal.

The rainfall has exceeded an inch except in a part of the northwestern portion of the State, and in a few small areas it has ranged from two to slightly more than three inches.

The continued cool, cloudy, wet weather has caused a rank growth of small grain and grass. Winter wheat is filling well but is lodging some on the richer ground and rust is appearing in many fields. While oats are growing well the crop is uneven. Spring wheat is beginning to head and is in a very promising condition. Clover, timothy and other grass is making a rank growth and promises a large crop of hay.

While corn has grown fairly well the week has been rather unfavorable for the crop. The continued wet condition of the soil has retarded cultivation and many fields are weedy. At the same time low temperature prevented rapid growth of corn. Nearly all crops need warm, dry weather.

CITY DADS SIT IN COUNSEL

Telephone and Telegraph Poles Are to be Removed from Main Street.

The city council met in regular session Monday night. The first thing on the docket was the passing of the ordinance requiring the removal of all the telephone, telephone and electric light poles from Main Street. The ordinance stipulates that these obstructions must be removed within sixty days. See ordinance elsewhere in this issue of the Journal.

Mr. Newman of the fire and water committee stated that some of the property owners were not complying strictly with the request to put in the proper fire escapes as was ordered some weeks ago. Mr. Newman said these escapes were ordered put in under the state law requiring such safeguards. After some little discussion on the subject the council extended the time for putting them in to three months.

The judiciary committee recommended that the ordinance compelling the removal of signs be revised so as to include the raising of awnings to a height of seven feet above the walks, also the cutting of weeds on the streets adjacent to sidewalks, and to remove all obstruction from the walks and other public places during certain seasons of the year. The ordinance was passed in regular form, fixing a penalty of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25 for each violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

Chief Speck of the fire department reported that a majority of the fire hydrants were in good condition, but that some of them were not. The report was referred to the proper committee.

The board of health reported one serious case of small pox at the pest house and that proper quarantine had been established and a nurse for the patient employed at a moderate expense.

The proposition to repair the sidewalk on Chicago avenue from Rock street to Patterson avenue was referred to the committee on streets, which was instructed to notify the property owners along this thoroughfare to repair the same within twenty days, or the city will repair these walks and assess the expense to the property.

Councilmen Buttery, Ebinger and Vondran were appointed to act in conjunction with Mayor Gering to consult with the state treasurer with a view of securing the city's outstanding bonds refunded at four per cent. If this is done, the bonds (which are now in the hands of eastern parties and drawing five percent interest) will be called in.

The petition of property owners on Granite street, asking that the natural water course on that street be reopened by means of a culvert by which flood waters might escape along both sides of the street, was, on motion of Councilman Fitzgerald, ordered laid on the table. The council should take some action in this matter as the property owners along the north side of this street are liable to damaging overflows when hard rains set in. Action should be taken in time.
