To Come Up at Nebraska City.

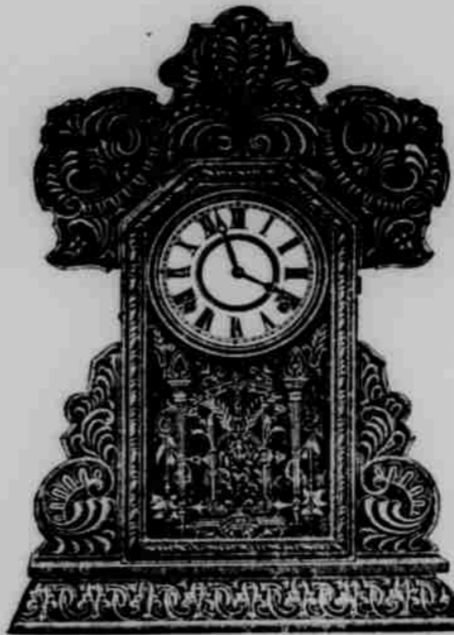

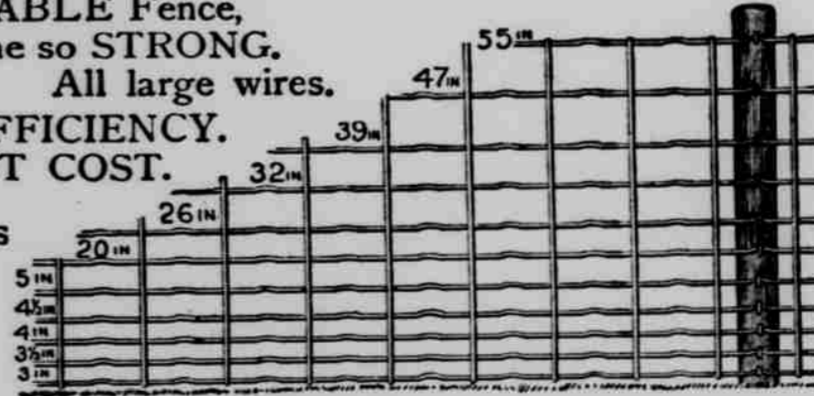
