## The New Wonderland Beyond Cody.

A new wonderland is now open to the hunter, fisherman and summer tourist—magnificent scenic region between Cody, Wyo., and Yellowstone Park. The Burlington has made practically half rates for summer trips from all points on its system to Cody and return, the gate way to this country.

From Cody west, the new road follows the north fork of the Shoshone River to Marquette, the location of the great government dam now under way for the storing of the waters of the Shoshone for irrigating 200,000 acres of Big Horn Basin lands. West of Marquette, two log cabin inns have been built by Col. Cody for the accommodation of tourists, one at Wapiti, 38 miles from Cody, and another at the Pahaska Tepee, at middle fork, 64 miles from Cody; from Middle Fork to Lake Hotel, Yellowstone Park, is 32 miles—the road crossing the Rockies at Sylvan Pass in the midst of some of the grandest scenery of the entire Rocky Mountain chain. The new region to be opened offers probably the finest trout fishing in the world, and, in season, ample elk and other game shooting.

The development of this country has been the work and pride of Col. Bill Cody, whose permanent home is at the Irma Hotel, Cody, Wyoming. Probably the most easiest and most natural way to arrange for a tour through this new region is to go direct to Cody, where all arrangements can quickly be made for the coach journey over the route, sojourning at the different log cabin inns, or for camp outfit, horses, teams, mules, guides and everything of this kind.

### Where Nebraska is First.

Nebraska is claiming precedence in many things these days. For Nebraska—or at least for a Nebraska man—is demanded the honor of having discovered the earliest and most delicious sweet corn in the world.

For many years the black Mexican was known as the earliest sweet corn, but the black kernels were objectionable to the eye. It was a sort of race problem in agriculture. This black corn grew ripe enough for the table in eight days, or ten days ahead of the white "Evergreen."

An ear of white corn—supposed to be a freak of nature—was found in a field of Black Mexican one day. It was removed, the kernels carefully planted in distant soil, and in fifty-seven days a toothsome new variety was ripe.

Later planting has fixed this seeming freak in an established species.

Nebraska puts herself upon the back for other reasons, too. It is said to have the largest creamery, the largest broom factory, the largest individual cattle feeding station and the largest and only beet sugar syrup and refining plant in the world.

It is the first state in the production of rye, third in the production of corn, fourth in the production of wheat, oats, cattie and hogs.

The second largest smelting works and the third largest meat packing industry are located there.

Nebraska is the first state in the production of vine seeds and yields more for seed purposes and yields more than all the balance of the United States combined.

It has the greatest number of distinct varieties of native pasture and hay grasses of any state in the union. In the eastern half of the state it claims to have land of the highest agricultural value in America, yielding more than any other equal area—Philadelphia North America.

### Not the Whole Cheese.

## Good Roads.

If the American home is to be preserved, the American farm must be fostered. The logic of this deduction will readily present itself. The higher schools and colleges are doing grand work, but the free common schools are the more important because they are the school of the multitudes in which are laid the deep and lasting foundations for coming lives of usefulness and for the betterment of mankind. The common schools are the schools of the rural population. Whatever tends to better these schools to make them stronger and of higher curriculum, to give greater efficiency and better discipline, and to make them easy accessible all the time, should be the concern of every patriotic citizen. Nothing can conduce such results as improved highways. Neither rural church or school, nor yet the farm, can flourish, where impassable roads abound, and if these cannot flourish our free institutions will soon or late topple and fall. The question of national aid to good roads is one the government cannot afford to ignore much longer. The necessity for it is so apparent that it is without the domain of controversy. Statesmen and philosophers know that good roads make good people. Improvements of highways means not only advancement of commercial interests, but also moral welfare. The highways are path-ways along which civilization and development move."
