TEACHERS' CERTIFICATES

State Department of Education and County Superintendents Have Agreed Upon the Tests.

The state department of education and the county superintendents of public instruction of the state have agreed upon rules and regulations governing the issuance of teachers' certificates under the new certification law passed by the last session of the legislature.

The examinations are to be held in each county on the third Friday and Saturday of each month under the supervision of the county superintendents. Four days will be given each applicant to complete the examination for a third grade certificate, five days for a second grade certificate and six days for a first class certificate. Six months from the date of beginning also will be allowed to complete the examination.

Friday morning—Bookkeeping, civil government, orthography, mental arithmetic, penmanship. Friday afternoon—Elements of agriculture, physiology and hygiene, blackboard drawing, English composition, theory and art of teaching. Saturday morning—Algebra, geometry, reading, arithmetic, English grammar.

Saturday afternoon—Botany, physics, geography, United States history. When the examination papers are completed they are forwarded by the county superintendent to the state examining board and examined by its members, being marked on the basis of 100 per cent as perfect. To secure a third grade certificate the applicant must have an average of 70 and not below 60 in any one study. A second grade certificate requires an average of 70 with no grade below 65; a first grade an average of 80 with no grade below 70. The county superintendent may raise the requirements in his own county, but cannot go below the general minimum. An average grade of 85, with no grade below 80, entitles the holder to a "with credit" certificate and an average of 90 with no grade below 85 to an "honor" certificate. These certificates practically are for life and may be renewed on presentation.

CITY OF PLATTSMOUTH WINS

Cass County Metropolis Comes Out Ahead in Prolonged Litigation With Eastern Bank.

A mandate was received Tuesday morning from the United States circuit court of appeals for the eighth district reversing the judgment of the United States circuit court for the district of Nebraska in the case of the city of Plattsmouth, as appellant, against the New Hampshire Savings bank. Judgment was rendered against Plattsmouth in the trial of the case in that city, the suit being for the recovery of a deficiency judgment amounting to \$3,336.25, being in the nature of foreclosure proceedings on the electric light plant of the city and for rental as stipulated in the lease in evidence, from November 15, 1900, to March 1, 1902, and for the stipulated value of the property turned over to the receiver. The case was appealed by the city of Plattsmouth to the circuit court of appeals, with the result that the decision of the lower court is reversed and dismissed and that the city of Plattsmouth shall have and receive costs against the New Hampshire Savings bank.—Omaha News.

THE COMPULSORY EDUCATION LAW

Children Must Attend School for at Least Three Months of the Year.

Subdivision N. V. 1, Section 1, School Laws of Nebraska, says: "Children not less than seven (7) and not more than fifteen (15) of age must attend the public day school not less than two-thirds of the entire time school is in session in the district in which they reside and in no case shall such attendance be for a period less than twelve (12) weeks," with the following exceptions:

- 1. Attendance at a private or parochial school.
2. Instruction at home by a person qualified to teach in the public schools.
3. The child being fourteen years of age and of necessity regularly employed for his own support or those dependent upon him.
4. Physically or mentally incapacitated.
5. Distance to nearest school more than two miles.

The attendance of children in private or parochial schools must be reported to the city or county superintendent.

School boards in city or metropolitan city school districts shall appoint truancy officers who shall enforce the provision of this law.

In other school districts, any superintendent, principal, teacher, or member of the school board shall report anyone who violates the compulsory education law to the county superintendent, "who shall immediately investigate the case and give written notice to the parties reported as violating this act; and, if in one week from the time of said notice such parties are living in violation of this act, then the county superintendent shall appear in the court of the county judge, and file his complaint against such parties violating this law. The county judge shall at once issue summons against the offending party or parties; such summons shall be served by the proper authorities as by law prescribed; the offending parties shall appear in court under penalty for contempt and answer to the charge which, if proven shall constitute in them a misdemeanor, subject to a fine of not less than five (\$5.00) dollars nor more than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars for each offense.
