Timely Advice.

As the season is at hand for setting upstoves, opening grates and starting furnaces, one cannot be too careful to avoid the dangers of fire in and about the home. Everything connected with the heating or cooking apparatuses, flues, chimneys and pipes should be inspected and put in good shape. Even with the best of care, disastrous fires often occur, their origin being seemingly veiled in mystery; but by far the oftener they are known to be the result of almost criminal neglect on the part of those whose business it is to attend to such things. Defective flues, cracked chimneys, badly protected pipes, the placing of the stove too near a board partition, or over a bare floor unprotected even by the usual zinc square, or the careless emptying of the ashpan in too close proximity to inflammable material, are but a few of these dangers, while cracked, broken or burnt-out stoves which allow coals, large or small, to drop out with a dribble of ashes, are largely responsible.
