CHAMPION CORN HUSKER

There has been a great many big corn husking stories going the rounds of the press of Nebraska, some of them perhaps largely magnified, but the champion corn husker of the state in reality hails from Greenwood, this county, and his name is W. J. Hollenbeck. It is said to be an actual fact that he shucked 2,450 bushels of corn in twenty-one days—averaging 116 bushels for twenty-one succeeding days. His best day's work was 145 bushels in nine hours, at the same time doing all his own hauling and unloading.
