More About Nebraska City's Commercial Club Company. WHY NOT ORGANIZE ONE HERE? It Does Not Cost a Great Deal to Each Member and May Do a Power of Good. An investment of a few hundred dollars in the organization of a commercial club similar to that recently organized in Nebraska City, may be the means of doing wonders for Plattsmouth and at the same time not be more expensive to any one member of the club more than another. If properly organized and officered it could do much in the way of reviving business and placing the city on the road to greater prosperity. The people of our sister city have been fortunate in electing a mayor who is equal to any emergency and has taken hold of the affairs as though he meant to bring the old town out of the kinks, and he is backed by 1,000 of the business men in his efforts. Mayor John W. Steinhart, of Nebraska City, is not any more equal to the occasion than our own Mayor Gering under similar circumstances. Let Mayor Gering have even two hundred of the business men of Plattsmouth and those who own property and are able to give to a worthy cause, back of him with their means the same as the 1,000 business men and property owners of Nebraska City are doing with Mayor Steinhart, and things will move lively from the start, and inside of one year visitors won't know it is the same town. The Nebraska City Commercial Club company is organized into shares, each share is valued at \$25.00 and payable at the rate of \$5.00 a year. The object of the company is to secure new enterprises and assist financially any manufacturers that are at present located there or may locate in that city later. The active management of the corporation will rest with the directors. No salaries will be paid to the directors or the officers of the company. The organization will have an aggregate of \$5,000 a year to use for the advancement and upbuilding of the city and is starting out with the determination of booming the city, encouraging new enterprises and keeping what they already have.

The Journal would like to see such an organization effected in Plattsmouth, and with every man who has the interests of the city at heart enlisted in the cause. Could this be possible and with our energetic mayor in the lead, and a strong pull, and pull all together, the result will be that Plattsmouth will put on a new impetus and soon be removed from the rut into which we have been groveling for so many years. If Nebraska City sees the necessity of a movement of this character in order to save themselves from erasure from the map of Nebraska it certainly behooves us to make a move in the same direction. And make it now, before it is everlastingly too late to do good.

PLANTING THE CATALPAS

The Burlington Setting Out a Big Grove Near Pacific Junction. Several months ago the Glenwood Tribune told of the plans of the Burlington railroad company to set out 200 or more acres of catalpa trees on the company lands near Pacific Junction, to be grown for making railroad ties. The Tribune of last week has more to say regarding the planting, as follows: "The work of setting out the trees began last week. Only about 100 acres will be planted to trees this year and more will be set out next spring. "The trees are being planted at the east end of the company farm which lies to the south of the railroad yards. They are being set 7 feet apart each way. "They are yearling trees and are about two feet high. As they are set deep in the ground they do not at this time make much of a showing. "The work of setting them out is in charge of E. M. Lang, the Junction yard boss. "The trees come from Connorsville, Ind., and are a native of the Wabash river valley. They are said to be a different species from the catalpa trees growing in this section, such as are commonly sold by nurserymen. "The Wabash catalpa is reported to be of much harder wood and a faster growing tree than the other varieties, and are therefore better adapted for use as railroad ties. "John P. Brown, editor of "Arboreticulture," published at Connorsville, was employed by the company to come to the Junction and start the work. He was there two days instructing the men as to the methods to be used in getting them out and caring for the catalpa. "It will require upwards of 115,000 trees to cover the 100 acres, hence there is a big amount of work about the undertaking."

Prospecting for Coal and Oil. An expert is now in Nebraska City for the purpose of prospecting for coal and oil, and he assures the people of that city that there is plenty of the goods if they will go down into Mother Earth deep enough. He assures them that if they go down from three to five hundred feet they will discover a good quality of coal, and in abundance. Kraft Gets Contracts for Elk's Suits.

At the meeting of the committee, appointed by B. F. O. E. of Nebraska to examine and decide upon uniforms for the convention, which will be held at Denver in July, the contract was secured by the Kraft Clothing Company of this city, through their representative, Frank Huston. Many firms from Lincoln, Omaha, Hastings and other cities throughout were after the order which requires between four and six hundred suits. The style which was accepted is of a light gray design, being a two piece suit, of which the coat is double-breasted with white buttons, and the sleeve having a chevron with "Nebraska" worked in one inch gold letters, above which is the state flower—the golden rod. A light gray hat with a purple band completes the uniform, which is very modest.
