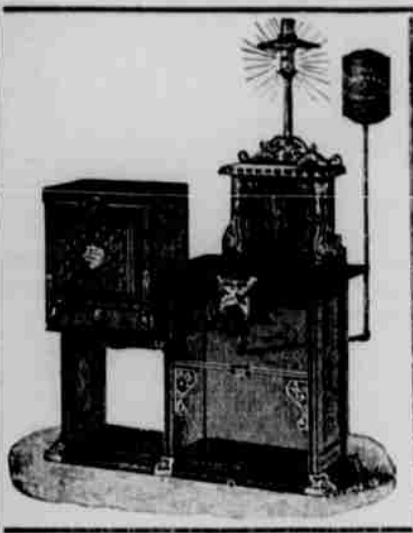

## THE RAILROAD EMPLOYEES

### The New Law Recently Passed by Congress for Their Benefit.

The Journal prints the following law, recently passed by the congress of the United States, in relation to railroad employes, which refers principally to those who are injured while on duty. It is not the law of any state or municipality, but it is a law of the whole land, and made so by the highest authorities of the country—the congress of the United States. Why we refer to this law at the present time is simply on account of the contract issued by the Burlington which all minors at the shops in this city are required to sign:

"An act relating to liability of common carriers in the District of Columbia and territories and common carriers engaged in commerce between the states and foreign nations to their employes.

"Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America, in congress assembled, That every common carrier engaged in the trade or commerce in the District of Columbia, or in any territory of the United States, or between the several states, or between any territory, territories, and any state or states, or the District of Columbia and any state or states or foreign nations, shall be liable to any of its employes, or, in the case of his death, to his personal representative for the benefit of his widow and children, if any, if none, then for his parents, if none, then for his next of kin dependent upon him, from all damages which may result from the negligence of any of its officers, agents or employes, or by reason of any defect or insufficiency due to its negligence in its cars, engines, appliances, machinery, track, roadbed, ways or works.

"Sec. 2. That in all actions hereafter brought against any common carriers to recover damages for personal injuries to an employe, or where such injuries have resulted in his death, the fact that the employe may have been guilty of contributory negligence shall not bar a recovery where contributory negligence was light and that of the employe was gross in comparison, but the damages shall be diminished by the jury in proportion to the amount of negligence attributable to such employe. All questions of negligence and contributory negligence shall be for the jury.

"Sec. 3. That no contract of employment, insurance, relief benefit, or indemnity for injury or death entered into by or on behalf of any employe, nor the acceptance of any such insurance, relief benefit, or indemnity by the person entitled thereto, shall constitute any bar or defense to any action brought to recover damages for personal injuries or to death of such employe: Provided, however, That upon the trial of such action against any common carrier the defendant may set off therein any sum it has contributed toward any such insurance, relief benefit, or indemnity that may have been paid to the injured employe, or, in case of his death, to his personal representative.

"Sec. 4. That no action shall be maintained under this act, unless commenced within one year from the time the cause of action occurred.

"Sec. 5. That nothing in this act shall be held to limit the duty of common carriers by railroads or impair the rights of their employes under the safety-appliance act of March second, eighteen hundred and ninety-six, and March second, nineteen hundred and three.

"Approved, June 11, 1906."

## Estimate of Wheat Crop.

The Daily Trade Bulletin of Chicago issued its annual estimate of the wheat crop yesterday. The crop of winter wheat is placed at 495 million bushels and that of spring wheat at 283 million bushels, making a total yield of 778 million bushels. Supplies carried over in second hands are estimated at 55 million bushels, and it is figured that 46 million bushels are still in the hands of farmers, making a total supply for the year of 821 million bushels. The estimated consumption for the year is 450 million bushels, leaving available for export during the year, and supplies on hand July 1, 1907, 296 million bushels. The aggregate world's crop is placed at 80 million bushels less than last year.

## NORRIS WAS MARRIED MAN

### Left Note Giving Reasons Why He Shot Girl—She Deceived Him.

A special from Nebraska City gives more particulars of the tragedy enacted at the Morton House in Nebraska City Wednesday evening, as follows: The body of Frank Norris who killed himself last night after shooting his sweetheart, Pearl Crouse, is still here in charge of the undertaker. It will be shipped to Plattsmouth, Mo., tomorrow morning and the inquest will be held tomorrow evening. It developed today that the head man is married and his wife resides near his old home in Missouri. He was the prodigal son of the family and his parents were unable to do anything with him. The girl is still alive and it is thought she may recover. She is shot just back of the right eye and the ball is still in her head. It is said by Dr. Marnell, who is in charge of the case, that she will most likely lose her eye, if she recovers from the wound. Norris prior to committing the deed wrote the following letter:

Nebraska City—Dear mother I hope you will forgive me as I am doing this over a girl that I love and she has done me dirty bury me by my grandfather.

Notifiy Allen Norris, Plattburgh, Mo., Frank.

Norris quit the Patterson-Brainard Carnival company to come back to this city on June 16th, to be with the girl. The girl's parents are here to look after her. She is still in the room at the hotel where she was shot, and will remain there until she is able to be taken to her home at Rockport, Missouri.

### Government Building Site.

It is a hard question to determine on which side of Main street the new postoffice building will be located. It is generally conceded that it will be located on Sixth street.

A Journal reporter has conversed with quite a number of those who have been very free to express themselves, and the sites referred to in a late issue of this paper seems to meet with the approval of all. In fact we have failed to come across one person who does not believe that the building should be located on Sixth street. Even the business men on the extreme lower part of Main street do not object to the proposition. Many believe that the block on which the Joe Fitzgerald residence is located is the proper place, while there are others who are favorable to the Patterson corner, if a sufficient amount of ground can be secured for the amount appropriated. It is said the block spoken of on the corner of Sixth and Vine can be purchased, and that the price will come within the limit of the appropriation. Of course bids for the various sites spoken of will be received, and of course the best one for the money will be accepted.

### Nelson Girl Bitten by a Dog.

While walking along the road near Henry Kauffman's farm, about four miles south of town, Miss Gladys, the eight year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Nelson, was attacked Friday by a savage dog, which bit her on the left arm near the elbow. The girl was taken home at once, and Dr. J. S. Livingston was summoned to dress the injured arm, which was badly lacerated by the dog's teeth. The patient is resting as comfortable as circumstances will permit, although she experienced considerable pain from the wound.

### Glenwood Keeps County Seat.

A special from Glenwood, Iowa, under date of Thursday, would indicate that our neighbor over the way had won out in the county seat fight: "The county seat contest in Mills county, by which the town of Malvern sought to remove the court house from Glenwood to Malvern, was settled today by the board of supervisors deciding that Malvern had not enough signatures on the petition. The board therefore decided that no election could be called. This is a decided victory for Glenwood from the fact that out of three members of the board two of them were workers for Malvern, residing in that town and vicinity. The board has been in session a month, although the result has been forecasted by the friends of Glenwood ever since the petition and remonstrance were filed."

Then the final home run to the county bastle with the two delinquents was made by the officers, who will not be called upon to perform any more calls upon these two for they will no doubt get to play ball (and chain) hereafter when placed at work under Mr. Janda.

Chas. Lambert is one of the fellows who was fined \$100 and costs for being "too familiar" during the street carnival. As he was unable to "enough up" the assessment he was sentenced to work it out on the streets.

Bert Eledge was fined \$10 and costs for vagrancy, fighting, being intoxicated and several other charges, and in default of which he was also given an opportunity to work out his fine.

### Go to Washington for a Chairman.

Hon. W. E. Andrews of Washington, D. C., and now auditor of the treasury, will preside over the republican state convention when it meets at Lincoln August 22. This was decided by the executive committee of the republican state committee, to whom the selection of a temporary chairman had been delegated by the full committee, at a meeting at the Millard hotel in Omaha last night.

### "Jimmie" at Deadwood.

The Journal is in receipt of a letter from Jimmie Archer, who is now playing ball with a Deadwood league team, and went up there the latter part of June. He says they have an excellent ball team, and that on the Fourth of July they played to a crowd of five thousand people, while a snow storm was raging. The team with which he is connected has played thirty-two games so far this season and have only lost five. The average attendance at each game has been from 1,500 to 2,000. Jimmie says there are many people visiting the Black Hills at present, and that Hot Springs is a great summer resort. He says the atmosphere is very light, but since getting used to it he likes it.

### May Secure Game With Cherokees.

The Red Sox are trying to secure a game with the Cherokee Indian team, which was organized on the 11th of May in Chicago. We understand that this aggregation carry their own side-wall and grand stand, and that they also have a system of electric lights, whereby they are able to play at night. The grand stand has a seating capacity of two thousand, and should the Red Sox be so fortunate as to secure a date with them, every seat will be occupied. The team at present is in Dayton, O., and is under the management of Messrs. Olson and McMillan.

### Returns From Peru.

Superintendent Rouse returned from Peru Friday, where he lectured before the Graded Teachers' Round Table for three days. His subjects were: "Some Teachers I Have Known," "An Examination That Counts" and "The Teachers' Rewards." The school has enrolled during the summer session 800 teachers. He predicts that the regular enrollment will reach that beginning next year.
