The Galloway Pass Fraud.

The story of the "Galloway Pass" told in the World-Herald today reveals a beautiful plot of trickery and deception practiced by the fake reformers who ran the republican campaign in Lincoln.

After one of their own candidates for the legislature in Nemaha county had procured a pass for Galloway, upon which he was to vote the republican ticket, they found he would not go. Thereupon they took the pass, had it photographed for reproduction in republican papers and falsely stated that Galloway was a democrat and that democrats had procured the pass. Then, to prevent exposure by Galloway, they got him to the asylum to do some work, kept him busy all day and detained him there for a night. Meanwhile the falsehood the conspirators had concocted was published, and Galloway learned of it too late to expose the fraud before election day.

It also now appears that more than one Galloway pass was filed out. The original was not enough. So many were needed for "copy" in preparing cuts for the various republican papers that several fakes on old blanks in possession of the g. o. p. committee were used, and in them the year appeared as 1900 instead of 1906. This was exposed by the World-Herald on the day before election.

RAILROAD RACKET

Tom Svoboda and Oliver Edmunds, two firemen in the local yards, handed in their resignations last night.

It is said that all clerks on the Union Pacific, drawing a salary less than \$100 a month will receive an increase in pay on January 1.

Hugh Cecil, who has been in the city for the past few days, returned this afternoon to Gibson, where he is fireman on one of the Burlington switch engines.

Workmen are now engaged in building the foundations for the first concrete-steel engine house structure on the Burlington system in the west bottoms of Lincoln.

A machine that will hurl coal into the firebox of a locomotive at the rate of 200 shovelful a minute if necessary will lighten the labor of the firemen of 700 of the engines of the Chicago & Northwestern road, the company having ordered 700 of these at a cost of \$350,000.

The Great Northern will soon turn over its O'Neill-Sioux City line to the Burlington for operating purposes, thus relieving that road of doing any business in Nebraska. It is said that the Hill interests can see no reason why the Burlington and Great Northern roads should both be doing business in Nebraska.
