Wedding Near Elmwood.

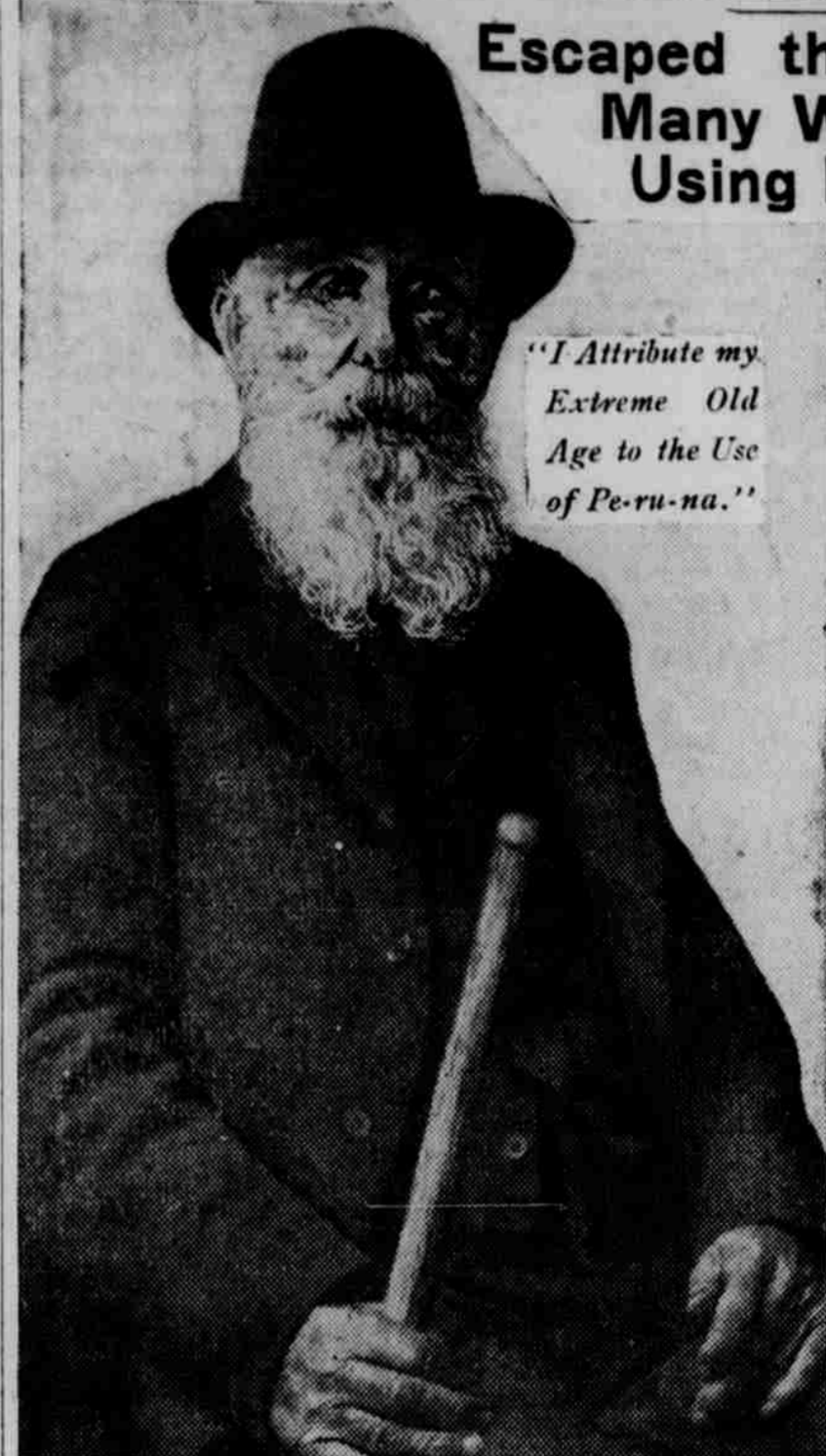

THE OLDEST MAN IN AMERICA
