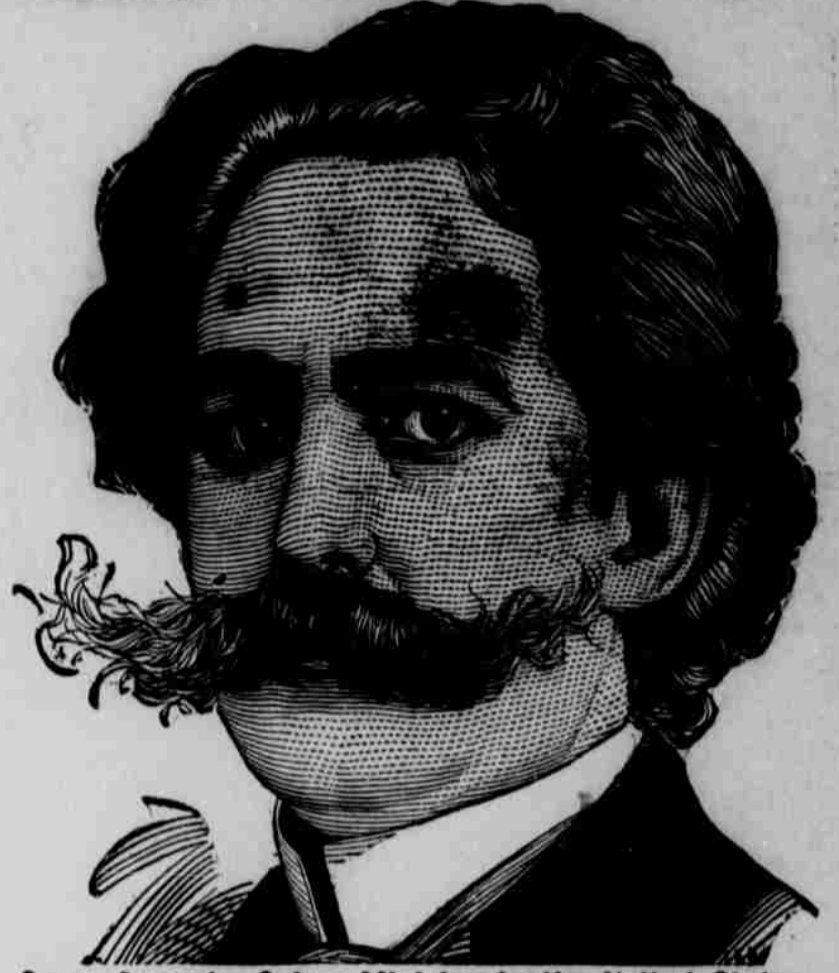
Better for the Public.

Because the railroads must call in freight train permits when the commerce law becomes operative January 1, the traveling public will benefit by being allowed to ride on a larger number of freight trains than in the past. Many traveling men carry these permits and are enabled to travel on freight trains on presentation. Concerning the abolition of these permits by law General Freight Agent Spens of the Burlington says:

"We are compelled to comply with the law. We realize it will work a hardship on the travelers and for that reason we will extend the passenger service to many trains on which the public is not allowed to ride. We want to offer the best service possible though of course there are some freight trains on which we cannot take passengers. In territories where the passenger service is limited we will designate more trains as mixed trains and thus care better for all passengers."
