IN CONVENTION

tional Rule Be Abandoned

The suggestion that the democratic nationational convention to be held in Denver may abondon the traditional rule requiring a vote of two-thirds of the convention for the nomination of candidates for president and vice president has precipitated an earnest discussion.

The two-thirds rule was adopted in 1844, long after the caucus system had been superseded by the convertion system. It was adopted for the immediate purpose of defeating Martin Van Buren for the presidential nomination and for the larger permanent purpose of protecting the slave states from the increasing power of the free states in democratic national conventions. It has been adopted by every democratic national convention since then. In republican national conventions a majority vote suffices for nomination.
