' For several weeks past there has been talk of nominating a citizen's ticket, but just why there was necessity for nominating such a ticket was never fully explained. It was agitated and advocated by certain individuals who were dissatisfied with the present administration and did not like the administration of Mr. Steinhart. One faction was opposed to the enforcement of the laws and the other favored a "wide open" town.

Those advocating the independent movement were some who held no allegiance to either party. They held that a great deal more could be accomplished by a non-partisan ticket than one nominated by either party. This argument is fallacious. There are only three parties in the fielddemocrats, republicans and prohibitiopists with a small sprinkling of socialists-and they include almost every voter in town. To claim that these parties cannot nominate individuals of sufficient mental capacity to govern the affairs of the city is a mistake. A "citizens" ticket is supposed to be composed of individuals who are not aligned with any party but on being placed in office will give us an administration far superior to that of any person who has been recognized politically and has loaned his services for the advancementof the town, both financially and politically. Will some of the advocates of the "citizens" ticket please tell the public why a non-partisan ticket is any better than one nominated in regular convention? Can more be expected from individuals who do not take sufficient interest in the city affairs to unite with a party than from those who are interested politically and for the best interests of the city?

Is the man who neglects to register a better citizen than the one who always has his name on the list, and would you trust the former quicker in administering the affairs of the city?
