A. N. Elmelund, County Clerk of Saunders County, Nebraska, eo hereby give notice that on May 21, 1993, Abel B. Fuller, Nelson Sheffer, H. D. Coleman, C. Kettle, R. K. Hays, C. D. Kettle, Chas.
