## NOTICE OF ELECTION.

Before the Board of County Commissioners of Saunders County, Nebraska.

### THE MATTER OF THE ORGANIZATION OF ASHLAND DRAINAGE DISTRICT.

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Pursuant to an order of the Board of County Commissioners of Saunders County, Nebraska, made and entered on the 23rd day of June, 1909, the authority vested in me by the statute of the State of Nebraska hereinafter described, I, A. N. Elmendorf, County Clerk of Saunders County, Nebraska, do hereby give notice that on May 21, 1909, Abel B. Fuller, Nelson Sheffer, H. B. Thomas, C. Kettle, R. K. Hays, C. D. Kettle, Chas. Miller, A. J. Sanger, Margaret Wollen, Mary E. Jespersen, H. Granger and R. Dean did file in the office of the County Clerk of Saunders County, Nebraska, their petition in writing and also their bond with interest thereon, and the main and form as by law required, and which said bond and the surety thereon was on said date by me approved, filed and prayed for said petition being for the organization of Ashland Drainage District, and said petition being in conformity with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of Nebraska, approved by the Governor thereof on March 27, 1907, entitled:

"An act to provide for drainage districts to drain wet land; and land subject to overflow and any lands which will be improved by drainage to build dykes and levees, to construct, straighten, widen, deepen or altar any ditch, stream or watercourse, to trap or otherwise protect the bank of any stream or ditch, to construct, enlarge, extend, improve or maintain any drainage system; to construct, enlarge, extend, improve or maintain any system of control of surface water or running water; and the rights, obligations and powers of such corporations including the power of eminent domain, the creation of debts, issuing and negotiating bonds, and the levying of special assessments on such real estate and the easements thereon as may be located by such public work, and defining the rights and powers of public officials; and the amendments thereto.

That the boundaries of said proposed Ashland Drainage District as fixed and determined by said Board of County Commissioners by said order entered on the 23rd day of June, 1909, are as follows, to-wit:

(All sections referred to below are in Township No. 10 North, Range No. Nine East of the Sixth Principal Meridian to twelve both inclusive are in Saunders County, Nebraska. All other sections referred to are in Cass County, Nebraska.)

Commencing at the center point of the intersection of Third and Dey streets in the city of Plattsmouth, Nebraska, thence west three blocks along the center line of Dey street to the center of the intersection of Dey street and Sixth street; thence north one block along the center line of Sixth street to the center of the intersection of Sixth and Silver streets in said city; thence west one block along the center line of Silver street to the center of the intersection of Silver and Tenth streets in said city; thence south two blocks along the center line of said Tenth street in said city to the east and west center line of Section 2 and 3 to the southeast corner of the west half of the north-west quarter of said section 2; thence north one-half mile to the north line of said section 7; thence west along the center line of said section 7 and section 4; to the northwest corner of section 4; thence south to the center of the west line of said section 4; thence east to the center of section 5; thence south to the center of the south line of said section 5; thence west along the south line of said section 5 to the northeast corner of the west half of the northwest quarter of section 8; thence south one mile to the southeast corner of the southwest quarter of said section 8; thence east along the south line of said section 8 to the northeast corner of the west half of the north-east quarter of section 17; thence south to the southeast corner of the west half of the north-east quarter of said section 17; thence west to the center of the west line of said section 17; thence south along the west line of said section 17 and section 20 to the center of the west boundary line of said section 20; thence east along the east boundary line of said section 20 and section 21 to the center of the east boundary line of section 21; thence north along the east boundary line of said section 21 and section 16 to the northeast corner of said section 16; thence east along the north line of sections 15 and 14 to the center of the east boundary line of said section 14; thence north to the northwest corner of the east quarter of the southeast quarter of section 11; thence east quarter of section 11 to a point where the same intersect the northeast corner of the west half of the right of way of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company; thence along the southeast boundary line of the right of way and depot grounds of the said railroad, Burlington & Quincy Railroad Company, to the northeast corner of a point where said boundary line intersects the center line of Main street in said city of Ashland; thence due north to the center line of Main street and across the depot grounds to the intersection of Third street one block to the point of beginning; the largest portion of the northeast quarter of said section 11, within said boundaries being located in Saunders County, Nebraska.
