A Peculiar Operation.

ORDINANCE No. 475.

An ordinance calling a special election in the city of Plattsmouth, county of Cass, state of Nebraska, for the purpose of paving the intersections of Fourth and Vine streets, of Fifth and Vine streets, of Seventh and Vine streets, and of the alley and street intersections of Fourth and Fifth streets, and known as paving district number 2.

Be it ordained by the mayor and council of the city of Plattsmouth, state of Nebraska.

Section 1. That a special election be and the same is hereby called to be held in the city of Plattsmouth, county of Cass, state of Nebraska, on Tuesday, the 3d day of May, A. D. 1910, at the usual polling places in said city to-wit:

First ward, at the county court house; Second ward, at Turner hall; Third ward, at A. G. U. hall; Fourth ward, at the council chamber; Fifth ward, at the corner building of A. G. Bach & Co., on Lincoln avenue. The polls in said wards will be open at 7 o'clock a. m., and close at 7 o'clock p. m., of said day.

Section 2. At said election the following proposition will be voted upon:—

Shall the city of Plattsmouth in the county of Cass, state of Nebraska, issue its bonds in the sum of \$500.00, each payable to bearer ten (10) years after date with interest coupons thereto attached, not to exceed five per cent payable annually, but redeemable, or any part thereof, on request of said city any time after one year from date of issue, said bonds to be dated the day of their delivery and interest and principal payable with New York Exchange.

Bonds shall be issued for the purpose of paving the intersections in paving district No. 2, of said city of Plattsmouth to-wit: The intersections of Fourth and Vine streets, and of Seventh and Vine streets, and of the alley and street intersections of Fourth and Fifth streets, and known as paving district number 2.

Section 3. As soon as practicable after the issue of said bonds is authorized as herein provided, the mayor and city council shall offer said bonds for sale to the highest bidder after giving notice of said sale as they may deem proper and to the best interests of said city, but said mayor and city council shall reserve the right to reject any and all bids for said bonds, and in no case shall said bonds be sold for less than par value.

Section 4. When said bonds are sold the proceeds thereof shall be paid to the treasurer of said city of Plattsmouth and placed to the credit of the paving fund of paving district No. 2.

Section 5. The form of the ballot in which the question shall be voted on is as follows:—

"For Paving Bonds."

Section 6. There shall be judges and clerks of election appointed by the mayor and city council and they shall hold office until the next general election shall be held in the same manner as a general city election.

Section 7. Notice of said special election shall be published in the Plattsmouth Semi-Weekly Journal for four consecutive weeks prior to said day of election.

Section 8. This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
