A BIG NEBRASKA COLONY ON THE PARRITA RANCH

W. E. Rosencrans & Son Sell Land There to Forty-one Nebraskans Who Improve It on a Co-operative Plan and Great Results are Looked For—Land Located in Seven Sections of Ranch

The following has been taken from the Falfurrias Facts, published at Falfurrias, Texas, under date of Oct. 21, as interesting to a number of our best citizens mentioned therein. The property to which it refers is the Parrita ranch, a tract of land of about 18,000 acres, being colonized by Messrs. Burton & Danforth of San Antonio, and was originally a portion of Mrs. H. M. King's 1,400,000 acres. It is located just 2 1/2 miles east of Falfurrias, Texas, and in the great gulf coast truck and citrus fruit country. We have been informed that this proposition was opened to the public less than one year ago. At present the greater part of it has been sold and is being colonized very rapidly, there being now over 2,500 acres going under cultivation, with the prospect of another 2,000 acres being added the coming winter. In the center of this property a new town called Flowella is being started, so called by reason of having in the center of the townsite a flowing well. At present Falfurrias is the nearest postoffice, but all necessary papers have been filed with the postoffice department for a postoffice at Flowella. It will be interesting to some of our readers to know that there is one single orange grove on the property containing 120 acres. Let "Rosy" tell you all about it. The article reads as follows:

by every purchaser per the acreage he owns, so that in the end each purchaser will have expended for land and improvements a like amount per acre. The eliminating of the fencing of individual tracts not only means a saving to every owner of land within the enclosure, but no land will be wasted along fences and in corners, and there shall be no excuse for weedy fence rows. Above all it shows that there exists among all the buyers a feeling of close harmony and co-operation that will bring about an interesting community at an amazing early date. Clearing has already begun on roads and 160 acres of land, and each subdivision of from forty to sixty acres is to have erected on it a suitable house for Mexican renter, and some of the best renters in the entire Falfurrias country have been assigned this land on the basis of one-fourth of the crop to the owner. It is expected that in the near future a well will be put down by one of the owners holding land near the center of the property, and the class of improvement before mentioned, together with its nearness to La Gloria is making this land most desirable to the best renters. It is most likely that they will occupy the land for a period of from two to four years; meantime a little attention on the part of each owner toward beautifying the property, such as shade trees and palms outlining the roads and a few acres of citrus fruits on each tract will do much toward rendering the proposition more profitable and interesting.

"It now appears as if Plattsmouth, Nebraska, and surrounding vicinity, is to furnish Parrita with the banner colony of the entire ranch. Soon after the opening of Parrita, the Messrs. W. E. Rosencrans & Son, of Plattsmouth, were chosen to represent Burton & Danforth in that vicinity, and developments have shown it to have been a wise selection. They have been able to interest the best citizens in that locality, many of whom have visited the ranch and everyone found conditions just as "Rosy" had represented. They have gone among men of varied vocations, and among their list of patrons are to be found politicians, business men, professionalists, farmers and others working for daily wage. Many have paid one-half cash, others all cash, and many have bought small tracts on the monthly payment plan, but out of the entire list of buyers, there does not appear to be one single person who has bought with the idea of speculation purely, but with the firm intent of sooner or later making substantial improvements and doing their share toward making Parrita one of the most complete communities in the entire gulf coast country of Texas.

Their purchasers have been scattered throughout many sections of the ranch, but in whatever section they have been placed all are to be found in one particular portion of that section. This colony is represented in sections 1, 9, 12, 20, 21, 23 and 26, sections 9 and 26 being occupied by them exclusively, and it has been predicted by those in close touch with all that is happening in Parrita that within a very few months these two last named sections will show some of the best improvement in the entire property.

Sections 9 and 26 are not full sections, being located in the extreme north end of the property, and contain approximately 750 acres. NOTICE OF PROPOSITION TO VOTE SPECIAL TAX.

The electors of the County of Cass, in the State of Nebraska, will take notice that at the general election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1910, the proposition of levying a special tax of \$1.00 on all taxable property of Cass County for the purpose of building a county jail will be submitted to a vote of the people. The proposition is set forth in the following resolution, to-wit:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Cass and the State of Nebraska, in regular adjourned session assembled this 4th day of October, A. D. 1910, that for the purpose of obtaining authority by a vote of the electors of Cass County, Nebraska, to levy and collect a special tax on all taxable property in said county for the purpose of building a county jail at the city of Plattsmouth, in said county and state, the question and proposition of levying and collecting a special tax for said purpose be submitted to the legal voters of Cass County in the State of Nebraska, at the general election to be held November 8th A. D. 1910.

That said question and proposition be submitted in the words and figures as follows:

Shall the Board of County Commissioners of Cass County, Nebraska, or other person or persons, charged by law with the levying of taxes for said county, for the time being, in addition to the annual taxes, cause to be levied a special tax of 2 1/2 mills on \$1.00 valuation on all taxable property of said county for the purpose of building a county jail at the city of Plattsmouth, Cass County, Nebraska, taking into consideration the requirements of the law and the provisions of the statutes in such cases made and provided, and the interests of said county and public may demand, said special tax to be levied and collected one year and one year only.

PROVIDED that said special tax of 2 1/2 mills be levied at the time of making the regular levy of general taxes in the year 1911, and be entered upon the tax lists for that year, and collected in the same manner as other taxes; and that proceedings shall commence for the erection of the said jail as soon after the authority is obtained from the legal voters as is possible under the law and provisions of the statutes in such cases made and provided, and be continued without unnecessary delay until the same shall be completed.

That said question and proposition above set forth shall be submitted to a vote of the legal voters of said county in the following form and manner, that is to say, the form of the ballots to be used at such election in favor of said question and proposition shall be as follows:

"I vote for the levy and collection of a special tax for the purpose of building a county jail."

And the form of the ballots to be used at such election against said question and proposition shall be as follows:

"I vote against the levy and collection of a special tax for the purpose of building a county jail."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

The following proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 8th, A. D. 1910.

"A JOINT RESOLUTION to amend Section one (1) of Article seven (7) of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska."

Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. Amendment constitution proposed. That section one (1) of article seven (7) of the constitution of the State of Nebraska, the senate concurring, be so amended as to read as follows:

Section 1. (Who are electors.) Every male citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this state six months next preceding the election and of the county, precinct or ward, for the term provided by law be an elector; provided, That persons of foreign birth who shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States and are voting at the taking effect of this amendment, may continue to exercise the right of suffrage until such time as they may have resided in the United States five years after which they shall take out full citizenship papers to be entitled to vote at any succeeding election.

Section 2. (Ballots.) That at the general election nineteen hundred and ten (1910) there shall be submitted to the electors of the state for their approval or rejection the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage. At such election, on the ballot of each elector voting for or against said proposed amendment, shall be written or printed the words: "For proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage," and "Against

said proposed amendment to the constitution relating to the right of suffrage."

Section 2. (Adoption.) If such an amendment be approved by a majority of all electors voting at such election, said amendment shall constitute section one (1) of article seven (7) of the constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Approved April 1, 1909.

Junkin, Secretary of State, of the State of Nebraska do hereby certify that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is a true and correct copy of the original enrolled and engrossed bill, as passed by the thirty-first session of the legislature of the State of Nebraska, as appears from said original bill on file in this office, and that said proposed amendment is submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Nebraska for their adoption or rejection at the general election to be held on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, A. D. 1910.

In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the great seal of the State of Nebraska, Done at Lincoln this 29th day of July, in the year of our Lord, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Ten, and of the Independence of the United States the one Hundred and Thirty-fifth, and of this State the Forty-fourth.
