

PLATTSMOUTH CITIZENS RE-ELECT JOHN P. SATTLER AS THEIR MAYOR

Democratic City Ticket Elected as Follows: Sattler, 133; Wurl, 285 Fricke, 299; Archer, 255—Schulhoff, Democrat and Wescott Republican Elected to School Board.

The election in this city Tuesday passed off very quietly, although a great deal of interest was manifested in the general result. Special efforts were put forth to defeat John P. Sattler for mayor and Carl G. Fricke for treasurer, both of whom were re-elected by handsome majorities. The fight made on Mr. Fricke seems to have had the effect to spur his friends to working that much harder for his election, and the vote below will show that they were successful. B. G. Wurl for city clerk was also elected by a big majority. In the First ward George E. Dovey was re-elected councilman, notwithstanding the desperate effort made to defeat him. In the Second ward Adam Kurtz pulled through by 17 majority. In the Third ward John Halstrom was elected by 10 majority, while in the Fourth ward George Lushinsky (rep.) defeated George Dodge. William Shea was elected in the Fifth ward. Thus it will be seen that the democrats elect four out of the five councilmen. That true and tried old veteran, Judge M. Archer, for police judge, came in with a majority of 255. Notwithstanding the fact that enthusiastic republicans claimed everything in sight on the morning of election, the result sounds very much like a regular Waterloo to them, and the cast-down appearance of the candidates Tuesday night, when the result was known, denoted that they felt very much that way. 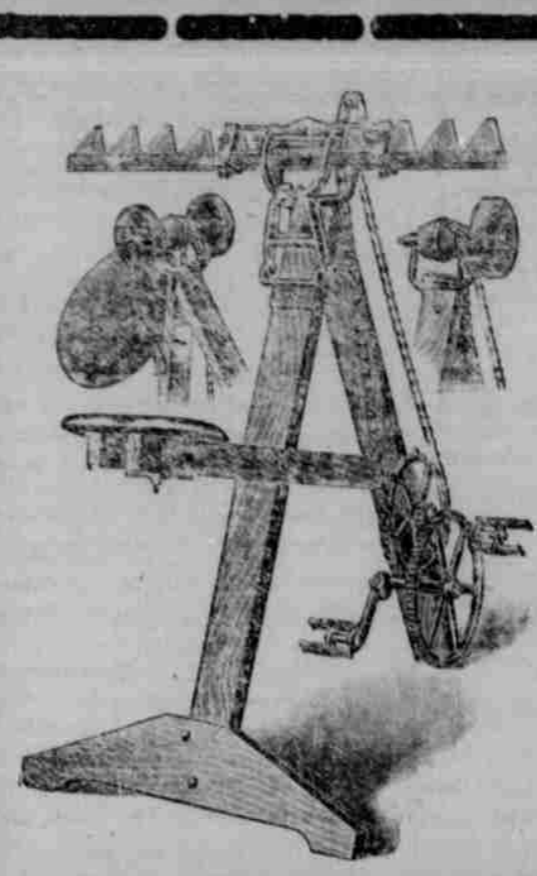
Sister Critically Ill.
