YOUNG MAN ACCIDENTALLY SHOT HIMSELF TODAY

Dr. Cummins at once got his speedy auto ready, and taking with him a man to bring the machine back, made all haste to the Platte river bridge, where he was met by a machine on the other side of the river and hurried to the side of the wounded man

He was going through a barbed wire fence at the time, holding the gun in his hand in his pocket to prevent the barbs from catching and throwing back the hamer. In some way his hand pulled the revolver hammer back and away sped the bullet into the fleshy part of his thigh, making a serious wound.

Dr. Cummins had the young man taken to St. Joseph's hosiptal, where the bullet was probed for and located on the opposite side of the leg, having passed nearly through the thick part of the thigh.
