Plattsmouth, Neb., Oct. 2, 1911.
Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present: D. Switzer, M. L. Friedrich and C. H. Jordan, County Commissioners; D. C. Morgan, County Clerk.
Minutes of previous session read and approved, when the following business was transacted in regular form:
Bill of Mrs. C. A. Adams for care of Daniel McNulty, amounting to \$46.12, refused on September 12, 1911, was this day reconsidered and \$45.90 allowed on the claim.
County Clerk filed his report of fees earned for third quarter 1911, \$234.37.
Register of Deeds filed his report of fees earned for third quarter, 1911, \$172.79.
Clerk of the District Court filed his report of fees collected for third quarter, 1911, \$44.16.
Petition of Louis Born and numerous others, asking for a good road from the City of Plattsmouth to the new wagon bridge across the Platte river, north of said city, reserved and placed on file.
The city council of Plattsmouth requested the Board of County Commissioners to furnish the chief of police with a key to the jail; also put in a gas light on corner of Fourth and Pearl streets. In the matter of furnishing a key to chief of police the Commissioners have no jurisdiction, and with reference to street lamp, if placed in front of jail, county will pay half expense of gas bill, but will not entertain the proposition to place lamp at corner of Fourth and Pearl streets.
