## SUBSTANTIAL AND CONVENIENT IMPROVEMENT

The plan contemplates cutting a large doorway between the dry goods department and the store room formerly occupied by Miss Myers' millinery store, thus increasing the ground floor space for the better handling of the large stock of goods. The store will be much more convenient and will be the only three-front store in the county, giving this popular firm of merchants an opportunity to better display the goods they keep for sale. The excuse given by some for going to Omaha because they could not get what they wanted in Plattsmouth will be largely overcome when the goods desired can be arranged in full view of the customer.

The grocery department will be moved from the west to the east room, which will be for groceries exclusively, and the two west rooms will be wholly devoted to dry goods, notions and carpets. Heretofore the grocery department has been handicapped by having a part of the dry goods line on their side also, but this line will now be at the front of the store. Customers coming in from the street will find the new plan much more convenient than formerly.
