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A GREAT RISK TAKEN FOR YOUNG EAGLES

Milwaukee Boy Let Down Over a 300-Foot Cliff and Secures Four Scrawpy Eagles.

L. R. Neitzel, well known in Plattsmouth, and a former resident of Murdock, in this county, sends the Journal a copy of the *Nama* (Idaho) Record, dated May 31, 1912, which contains the following interesting story, in which Mr. Neitzel was one of the participants. And, by the way, we note that a former well known citizen of Plattsmouth, in the person of M. D. Polk, appears at the mast-head of the Record as editor:

Above the Murphy reservoir on Sinker creek, the stream passes between walls of rock that rear almost straight up to a height of from 300 to 500 feet. In this wild, weird canyon noted for its scenic beauty, a pair of bald eagles have made their home for several years. The nest may be seen high up on a point where the stone wall forms a narrow shelf. The old birds, that look as if they would measure 12 feet from tip to tip of wing, have long raised their young here unmolested, as there was no way to reach the nest except on the end of a rope, an undertaking so hazardous few people would care to try it. C. R. Hermeson of Milwaukee, who, with H. R. Neitzel and a party of friends were looking over the irrigation project, concluded he would like to have the birds that could be seen and looked to be fully half-grown.

No rope could be obtained, but Mr. Hermeson was insistent, so a wire was secured that would hold him, and after an arduous climb to the top of the canyon, some distance up the stream, it did not take long to get located 100 feet above the eagle's nest. After fastening the wire to his person, Mr. Hermeson was let down until he reached the narrow bench

300 feet above the stream. He walked along this until he reached the nest, and after a little trouble, he got three of the birds, the fourth flying and falling to the bottom of the cliff, where it broke the tip of one wing. With a long pull and a strong pull, the bird fancier was safely landed with his prizes. The bird that fell out of the nest was captured later and all four were brought to Nampa. Here they were carefully caged, and with plenty of feed they were billed out by express to Milwaukee, where they will be presented to the city park authorities.

It was lucky for Mr. Hermeson that the old eagles were out hunting and did not know their home was being invaded. Had they been in sight this would have been a different story. No man unarmed could have visited the aerie without being seriously injured. The other members of the party were D. D. Briggs, Mr. Newcome and W. J. Piepenbrink, the latter the Milwaukee sales manager of the Owyhee Orchard company.
