**Lawsuits Galore.**

Heshiro Miyamoto, of Japan, brought replevin in Judge Archer's court this morning, describing in his affidavit 18 boxes of chinaware, toys and high-strike machinery and shelf lumber contained in car No. 35580 Sante Fe, in the Burlington freight yards, and making the C. B. & Q. defendant in the suit, the answer day to be next Tuesday, the 16th inst. Attorney Dwyer appeared for the plaintiff.

A very complicated suit also pending in Judge Archer's court is one brought by Attorney W. H. Buddah of Omaha, in which Thomas S. Kelly is plaintiff and James Marshall is defendant. The amount in controversy here is \$460 for goods or money advanced. The suit was originally one of replevin in an Omaha court of the goods from one Riley, the goods being stored by the Kelly people, were taken out of storage and shipped to Plattsmouth to the defendant, Marshall. The replevin papers were served last

night and the goods allowed to remain in the custody of the railway company. Today Stewart Eaton and another gentleman brought an attachment suit in Judge Archer's court attaching the same goods which Mr. Kelly replevined, their claim being for wages in the sum of \$57.

For the past month a force of men have been working in this and Cass county selling ranges to the farmers. One of the crew of men sold 40 ranges in less than a month in Cass county and secured from \$72 to \$82 for each range and the same range can be purchased from any dealer for from \$45 to \$55. Still these men go out over the country and sell them to farmers, taking their notes for the same, where they cannot get the cash. It seems easy to sell things this way and the price seems to cut no ice. This gang left Olce county yesterday and moved down into Nebraska county, where they will work for a short time, or until they are stopped by reason of not having a peddler's license. Why the farmers and others patronize this class of men and pay the high prices, when they can purchase cheaper at home is something we cannot understand.—Nebraska City News.
