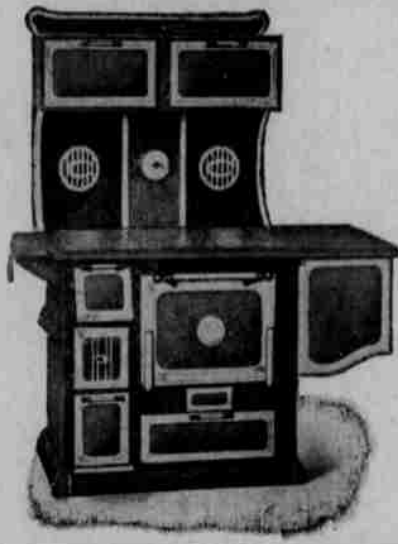

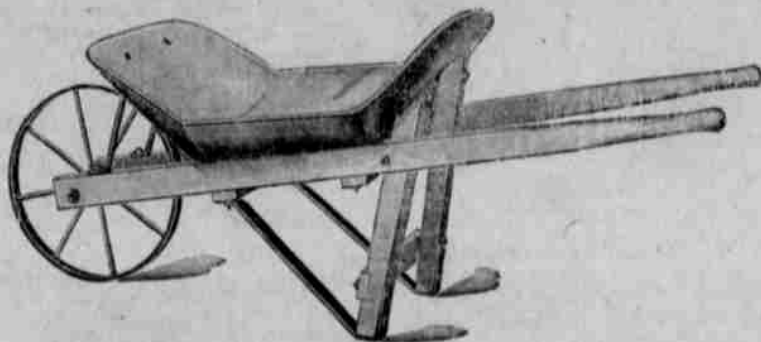

## COMPLETION OF THE M. W. A. BUILDING

The last bit of ceiling in the corridor and hallway below was put on yesterday by the carpenters and painted by Mr. Rummerfeld.
