SOMETHING DOING IN JUDGE ARCHER'S COURT

H. M. Buddha, the Omaha lawyer, who was here some time ago trying the carnival cases, was a Plattsmouth visitor today. The case of Kelly vs. Marshall, in which the plaintiff replevined the "Girl in Red" and other parts of the Twentieth Century Carnival, came up for trial in Judge Archer's court this morning. The defendant failed to appear and the plaintiff took judgment by default. The court found that the plaintiff had the right of property and right of possession at the time the goods were taken and entered judgment accordingly, and for 6 cents damages. The court was of the mind to make the damages 1 cent, but the plaintiff's attorney objected and insisted on the court making the damage 6 cents, and there being no one to object to the amount, should a higher court deem the 6 cents excessive, Justice Archer entered judgment accordingly.
An attachment suit, in which Reaton is plaintiff and Riley defendant, will come up for hearing on the 24th inst., which is one week later. The same goods are in controversy, but as a good bond has been given, with some of the most substantial citizens of the city as sureties, the defendant is not worrying at all about the damages should the court award him any.

ANOTHER OFFENDER THAT NEEDS OFFICIAL ATTENTION

To the Editor of the Journal:
While there is being so much apparent concern over the auto speeder at this time and while it is of speeders (of which this vicinity has few), it might here be proper to call attention to the law which relates to throwing dangerous (to automobile tires, etc.) substances in the road. It is just as much the duty of the officers to enforce this as it is their duty to attend to the other laws; besides, if they want the support of the motorists to discourage speeding they can do so by helping the motorist in those things which the motorist is by law entitled to. Here is a copy of the law:
"That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person, association or corporation to throw or cause to be thrown, leave or cause to be left upon any public road, bridge, street, alley or sidewalk in this state, any glass, crockery, tacks, nails or any sharp or broken substance whatever, liable to injure any person, animal or vehicle. The fine for violation is up to \$100."

It is the common practice for any drunken person to be permitted to break the just emptied beer bottle, even upon Main street, and one see this right along and the violator should be dealt with severely, just as the police mean to deal with the law-breaking speeder in crowded or dangerous places. CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION FOR MACHINIST

The United States Civil Service commission announces an examination for the position of machinist for service in the signal service at large, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum, location, Fort Omaha, Neb. No educational test will be given, and it will not be necessary for applicants to appear for examination. The examination will consist of the subjects mentioned below, weighed as indicated:
1. Physical ability, weights 40.
2. Training, experience and fitness, weights, 60; total weights, 100.

All statements relating to training, experience and fitness are subject to verification. Age limit, 20 years or over on the date of examination. The examinations are open to all citizens of the United States who comply with the requirements. It is desirable that the appointee to this position should be skilled as a machinist in lathe and other work and also have knowledge of electrical wiring, etc.
For application blanks address the board of civil service examiners at the postoffice, Omaha, Nebraska. No application will be accepted unless properly executed and filed with district secretary prior to the hour of closing business on August 31, 1912.
