The brakeman was doing his best to get it stopped, but the brake appeared not to work and on up the grade came the car. The crew of the special abandoned their train and stood aside when the shock came. Everything movable on the special was deftly piled to one side of the track, but the amount of damage would probably not exceed 200 cents.
