UNION SCHOOL HOUSE DESTROYED BY FIRE

School Children Escape Without Injury and Some of the Contents Saved.

From Wednesday's Daily.

This morning about 9:30 o'clock fire broke out in the High school building at Union and in a short time the building was a mass of ruins. The structure was a large two-story frame building, and fortunately was not near any other buildings or the result might have been more disastrous than it was, as Union has had a number of fires that have wiped out whole sections of the town.

The fire is supposed to have caught from the furnace. Catching the floor of the furnace room and spreading to the primary room, which was situated just over the furnace room, and in a few minutes the fire spread over the entire building. The scholars were all gotten out safely and most of the books and the organ belonging to the school were saved by the heroic work of the pupils and citizens who responded to the fire alarm. It is most fortunate that none of the pupils were injured in the fire, and demonstrates the benefits of the fire drills that are used in the public schools.

The school building was erected in 1889 at a cost of several thousand dollars, and the school board has been contemplating the erection of a new brick building, as the old building was not large enough to accommodate the scholars. The school will be held in the M. W. A. hall and one of the churches until a school building can be erected in the village.

D. 1912, there shall be submitted to the legal voters of said county the question and proposition of voting and issuing the bonds of said County in the amount of \$19,000.00 for the building of a county jail in the City of Plattsmouth, in the County of Cass, and repairing the heating plant in the county court house at Plattsmouth and for the causing to be levied annually a tax on all the taxable property in said county sufficient for the payment of the interest on all bonds and for causing the levy of annually a tax on all taxable property in said County sufficient to pay two of said bonds, and at the rate of five per cent. per annum, and that two of said bonds levying a tax on all taxable property of said county of the principal of said bonds, and at the rate of five per cent. per annum, and that the tax levied on said bonds be payable one year after date, May 1st, 1914, and two of said bonds to become due each year thereafter, and all become due and all of said bonds to be redeemable at any time on or after five years from the date of issue of the said bonds, and that the County of Cass, and bear interest at the rate of not more than five per cent. per annum, payable annually on the 1st day of May of each year, for which interest coupons shall be attached, payable at the Fiscal Agency, aforesaid.
