At a meeting of the commissioners, held on Wednesday of last week, a resolution was passed to submit to the voters the proposition of issuing bonds in the above sum. The bonds are to be of \$1,000 each and two of said bonds are to be retired each year. The work on the jail is to be started on or before the first of May, 1913.—Louisville Courier.
