THOUGHTS OF THE WINTER SEASON

Some morning you will wake up and look out on a whirling mass of snow, and realize that the cattle need some extra attention and there must be some more wood cut to keep the stoves roaring and the house warm. You will have a few hours of hustling work out in the nipping air, then the long winter evening around the fire with nothing to worry about until another day.

You will give special attention to the cattle and horses and hogs and chickens when the bad weather comes, and be sure they are snugly housed and well fed. And if you will take care to see that the children have warm clothes and plenty to eat and a place by the fire. But have you given any thought to a little more attention to those young folks in helping them spend these long winter evenings enjoyably.

Yes, if they are going to school they should study some. But they will not want to study all the time. You can probably enjoy yourself reading the daily paper and dozing a bit by the fire, but they want something a little more interesting for part of the time.

When you are in town this fall, take a few dollars of that money you got for your wheat and buy a few good, interesting books by standard authors. Perhaps it would not be a bad thing to get a game or two, of the kind that require a bit of skill and yet are not too hard for little folks. But get the books anyhow.

Then, on the long evenings, let the children take turns reading aloud. Don't make that the whole program of the evening, but try it out and if it is as much of a success in your home as it has been in some we know about, you will have no complaint about the time of reading aloud being too long. Take a turn at it yourself, and let all those who can read understandingly have a chance.

We know a family in the country where this has been a regular custom for years. You would be surprised to know how many good standard books that family

has read and enjoyed together and how excellent a taste for literature every member of the family has. If you can develop this taste in your young folks you will have little trouble about "What shall we do tonight?" or little worry about them wandering about seeking companionship and enjoyment away from home.

OPPOSES HOME AND HOME INTERESTS

A "Scab" Paper Attempts to Run Down Interests of Town in Which It is Launched.

Yesterday morning there appeared in the paper that has only been in existence two days—the "Morning Herald"—an editorial that not only causes one to doubt the sanity of the writer, but that is also a most unwarranted attack upon the business interests of the town, the interests that go to make up the life of the town.

The fact that the Journal saw fit to print an article in regard to trading at home in preference to trading with the catalogue houses, seems to have inspired the Herald writer to rush to the defense of the destroyers of the small town. It has been the policy of the Journal since the present owner assumed charge of the plant to stand for all that was in the interest of Plattsmouth and the interests of its business life, and that will continue to be its policy, regardless of what any outsider may consider, and the people of Plattsmouth are perfectly capable of judging whether the paper that defends the common home of us all is not in the right more than the interloper who seeks to gather notoriety by attacking the business interests of the town.

No man or woman of any judgment will for a minute believe that the local merchant charges more for his goods than the same can be purchased for elsewhere. In fact, in many instances, goods are sold in this city at prices several dollars lower than in Omaha, and in buying from the local merchant the customer sees what he is getting. If there is anything not satisfactory about the article purchased the local man takes them back, but when you send your money to the catalogue house you take what they send you, and if it is not satisfactory you have either to keep it or throw it away as a bad investment.

Without the local merchant you would not have a town, and if everyone in a community would follow the advice of such a sheet as the Herald there would be no town left, for if the merchant does not receive the patronage of the citizens of the community he cannot afford to continue in business, and the result, the small town is a collection of empty buildings, with only a few small bore loafers left to glory in the ruin their knocking has accomplished and full of stories of how good the town used to be.

Plattsmouth has stores that would be a credit to a much larger town, and the merchants have always striven to give their customers the best the market affords, and that at prices that cannot be beat, even by the catalogue houses of the large cities. We believe in the doctrine of home first, and if anyone doubts the truth of the statement they have only to look over the columns of the Journal in the past and they will discover this fact. We must stick to the small merchant or the fate of the small town is sealed. Bear that in mind the next time any more scurrilous articles are circulated reflecting on the business men and set them down as the vapors of some irresponsible person who was unable to work them with some wildcat scheme.
