Saturday evening, December 21, 1912, being the twenty-fifth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Boyles, the members of the Women's Reading club and their husbands decided to give them a pleasant surprise by gathering at their home in the evening. The club presented them with a silver platoon. The out-of-town guests were: Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Boyles and Miss Verna Hyder of Lincoln, and Ray Cole of Mynard, each of whom brought silver forks. A very pleasant evening was spent.

Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary.

On December 18, 1912, a host of friends and neighbors gathered at the home of Rev and Mrs. E. L. Uptegrove, near Alvo, to attend the celebration of their fiftieth wedding anniversary, bringing kindest wishes and beautiful and valuable presents and \$60 in gold. A delicious luncheon was served to about eighty guests during the afternoon and evening. The bride of fifty years ago, who was Miss Elizabeth Charlotte McKinsey, was attired in a beautiful black silk dress with a modest touch of lavender. She was born in Lincoln county, Missouri, September 7, 1815; united with the Cumberland Presbyterian church in August, 1865, and has ever been a consistent and conscientious Christian and an inspiration to her husband. The groom wore the conventional black Prince Albert. Rev. Uptegrove was born in Lincoln county Missouri, June 7, 1840. He identified himself with the Cumberland Presbyterian church at Old Juiver congregation in Lincoln county, Missouri, January 5, 1857; joined the Salt River Presbytery and entered the ministry October 5, 1860, and has been an active and zealous worker for the betterment of humanity and the upbuilding of the Master's cause for nearly fifty years. He was one of the pioneer preachers of northeastern Missouri when church services were held in the little log cabin school houses, which were located about fifty miles apart, and the salary was quite small. He served in the Fifth Missouri regiment, M. S. M., from September, 1864, until March, 1864. He has always been a staunch republican and is an ardent admirer of W. H. Taft. Rev. E. L. Uptegrove and Miss Elizabeth C. McKinsey were married in Lincoln county, Missouri, December 18, 1862, where they lived until November, 1888, when they moved to Brownville, Neb., coming to Alvo about six years ago. To this union were born one daughter and six sons, five of whom are now living. They are: Mrs. Harry Appleman, Lincoln, Neb.; E. L. Uptegrove, jr., Sidney, Neb.; Frank Uptegrove, Fisher, Kas.; William Uptegrove and Tucker Uptegrove of this place. The smiling faces of Rev. and Mrs. Uptegrove plainly indicate the happiness enjoyed in the past 50 years. We extend congratulations. The relatives and friends from out of town were: Mr. and Mrs. E.
